NOTICE OF BOND SALE.

Sealed bids will be received until the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. the 11th day of December, 1919, by the undersigned and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon, at the office of said court in the County Court House in Bend, Oregon, for the purchase of bonds of said county issued for the building of permanent roads there in the sum of \$125,000, same being the whole of an authorized issue of \$125,000, same being in denominations of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 upwards, dated November 1, 1919, and maturing serially in numerical order as follows:

\$18,000 four (4) years from date of issue; \$18,000 five (5) years from date of issue; \$18,000 six (6) years from date of issue; \$18,000 seven (7) years from date of issue; \$18,000 eight (8) years from date of issue; \$18,000 nine (9) years from date of issue; \$17,000 ten (10) years from date of issue.

Said bonds to bear interest at five and one-half per cent (5½) per annum, payable semi-annually on May and November first, principal and interest payable in United States gold coin at the office of the County Treasurer or at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in New York City, at the option of the holder.

Said bonds must be accompanied by a certified check for 5 per cent of the par value of the bonds bid for and must be unconditional.

TO ANNA G. INGERSOLL, Defendant:
IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons upon you, to-wit: within six weeks from the 26th day of November, 1919, and which said date is the date of the first publication hereof, and if you fail to appear and answer within said time, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in said complaint, to-wit:

FIRST that the sum of \$1,700.00 with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the 13th day of September, 1917, for the sum of \$170.00 attorneys fee, and for his costs and disbursements herein.
