RULES GIVEN FOR SENDING PACKAGES

With a comparative few of the American Expeditionary forces remaining in Europe, regulations just received by Acting Postmaster Hudson governing the sending of Christmas packages overseas, have undergone a change from those in effect last year.

The new instructions provide that a parcel may weigh not more than seven pounds, must be not more than 72 inches in combined length and width, must be marked with the complete address of the soldier to whom it is sent, and must be marked "Christmas parcel." For delivery in France, England, or Germany by Christmas, packages must be at Hoboken by December 8.

ASSOCIATION LOADS CAR OF POTATOES

When in town Monday on his regular weekly visit in the interests of the Deschutes valley potato growers association President Gus E. Stadig, of Lower Bridge, announced that the association was now loading a car of

potatoes for members living in the Bend district. The price being received for this car load is three cents per pound and Mr. Stadig says he expects to see the price still higher.
