

ELKS MEMORIAL SERVICE SOON

SUNDAY AFTERNOON, DECEMBER 7, SET ASIDE AS TIME FOR HONORING MEMORY OF DEPARTED LODGE MEMBERS.

Preparations for the first memorial service of Bend Lodge No. 1371, B. P. O. E. will be well under way within the next few days, it was announced Thursday by E. P. Mahaffey, exalted ruler of the lodge. The services will be held at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of Sunday, December 7, in the Bend Amateur Athletic club gymnasium, he stated. John B. Coffey, of Portland, will give the memorial address, and an elaborate musical program is being worked out by a committee headed by Wilson George.

The memorial services this year will be for but two "absent brothers," Vernon A. Forbes and Ralph Poindexter. Although the death of the two Elks occurred before the institution of Bend Lodge No. 1371, they were virtually the founders of the local B. P. O. E. organization, and their names will be read when the roll of the absent is called.

An important realty deal was closed on Thursday when the building committee of the Bend Elks lodge purchased three lots facing on the river, in block two, original townsite of Bend, from F. O. Minor and Mrs. Rachel McCaffery for a total consideration of \$4250. The lots have a frontage on the river of approximately 85 feet, are 135 feet deep, and have a rear dimension of 145 feet.

The property will be used as the location for an Elks home.

GILBERT WINS IN ONE ROUND

Fred Gilbert of Bend and Jimmy Burns, of Kankakee, were scheduled for a 10 round bout in the smoker at the Gymnasium Thursday, but it took just one round for Fred to put the Illinois lad in cold storage. A right hook to the jaw was the sleep signal, and while the lanky Kankakee boy writhed on the mat in a vain endeavor to come out of his trance, referee Willard Houston counted the decisive ten.

While he lasted, Burns was fast and carried a wicked punch, for before the round was half over he dropped Gilbert to his knees with a straight jolt to the chin. The Bend fighter, however, showed no bad results and continued to force the fighting until opportunity offered for his short, powerful knockout blow.

Speck Woods, of Bend, and Carl Martin, of Portland, fought a six round go, which would have been announced a draw had not Woods fouled his opponent with a jab below the belt, late in the final frame. Referee Houston immediately forfeited the go to the speedy Portlander, and won a storm of applause from the fans. For the first five rounds Woods was content to allow Martin to lead the fighting, but occasionally lashed out with his left to Martin's jaw. At the end of the fifth round the fight was Martin's, but Woods put on an offensive campaign in the last round which would have evened up the score.

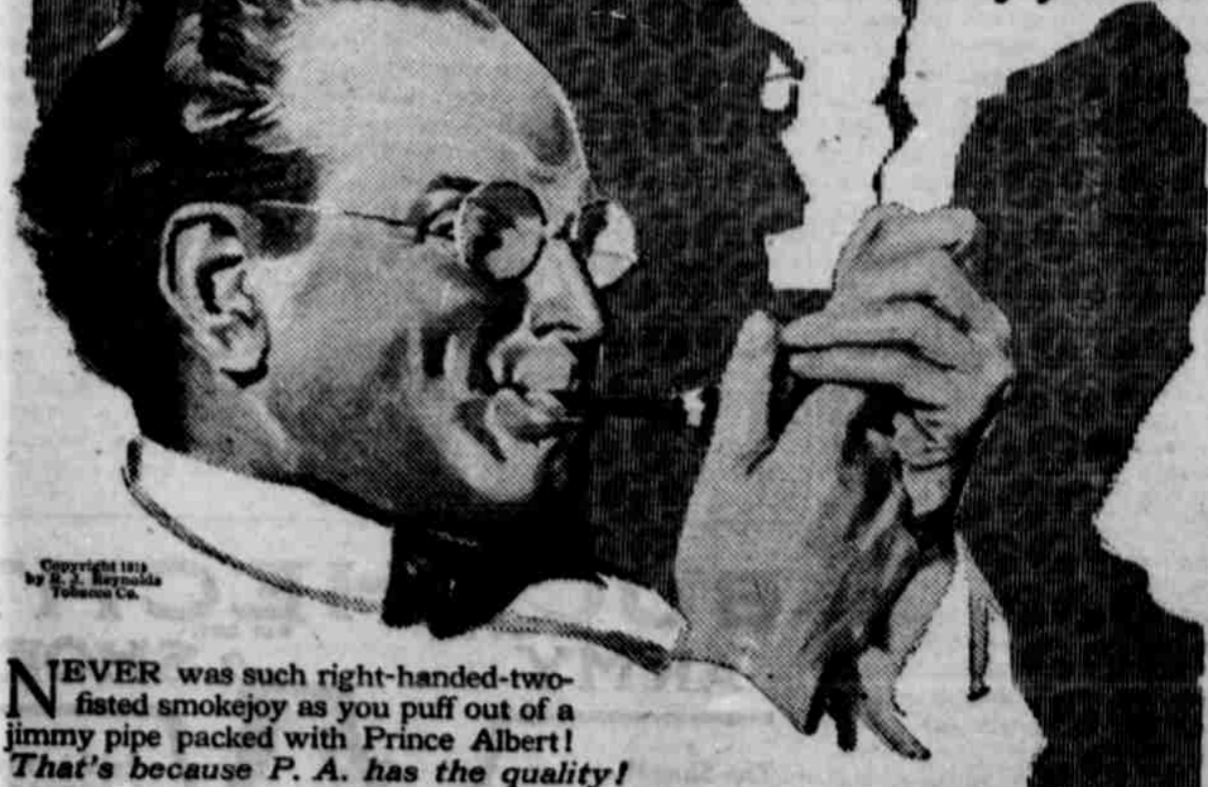
