

BIG FUTURE FOR Y. M. C. A. IN BEND IS SEEN BY SECRETARY

That the Industrial Y. M. C. A., with headquarters in the Bend Amateur Athletic club building may become a center of community activity in the city, filling an important part in the life of the people of Bend, is the prediction made by L. W. Trickey, general secretary of the association here, in his report for the first month following the taking over the management of the club building by the new organization. In his statement of conditions and outline of developments to be expected, Mr. Trickey says:

"There is no reason why the Bend Industrial Y. M. C. A., should not become one of the finest community centers in the country and eventually project a physical, social, educational and religious program second to none in the United States. During the last two weeks events have occurred and arrangements made which signifies a pretty good start in this direction.

"The Library association is already making plans to convert a room of the building into an up-to-date library with correct supervision, which will attract hundreds of people to the building in the course of the year and also make a very attractive addition to the club privileges. The Library association will also assume a small proportion of the expense involved in the upkeep of the building to the extent of about \$40 per month.

"The Boy Scouts have already established their headquarters in the room above, heretofore unused space and are transforming it into an attractive home for the 40 or 50 boys under Scout Commissioner Parry. I would recommend that no charge to be made for this space to the boys.

"The Civic club, the newly formed Ladies' organization is also using the building as a headquarters and meeting place.

"Our contract with the school is continuing to operate satisfactorily and during the month two to three hundred high school students have received benefits from the physical training and instruction in the art of swimming under Miss Dewes.

"A request has been made by the Percy Stevens Post of the American Legion for the use of the building one evening per month, which I think should be granted to them without cost or question of membership.

"On Monday evening next a big night has been planned to be known in the future as Mill night or shop night when a committee of men from the two mills will arrange for a program of boxing, wrestling and other stunts as well as vocal and instru-

mental numbers, drawing the talent largely from the employees of the mills. It will be free to mill employees, their families and friends.

"On New Years night a local talent vaudeville show will be presented to the members of the association under the direction of Mr. Noble who has consented to become the Social and Entertainment secretary for the organization.

"The Ladies gym class has been reorganized and a basket ball league of 8 teams is now practicing for the real thing next month. Miss Dewes the school physical director for girls is in charge of this work.

"The Ellison White Lyceum Concert consisting of five numbers will commence January, 19th, and will undoubtedly be strongly supported by the general public.

"During the month the Elks Lodge and the Central Labor Union rented the hall for special events.

"The Building campaign was officially closed during the month and Mr. Allen, Treasurer for the fund, has begun collections.

"Mr. McDonald, the new physical director will arrive about December 15. He has had 5 years experience at the West Side Branch, New York City, one of the largest branches in the country; also 3 years on the Mexican border. He is at present holding a commission in the army and is directing athletics for the Ninth Engineers, El Paso, Texas. On his arrival he will immediately put on an intensively organized program for men women and boys, volleyball. In the meantime, Mr. Wagner of the Brooks-Seaton mill is assisting in the organization of an indoor basket ball and indoor base ball league for industrial men.

"Our receipts for the two weeks ending November 30, 1919 were \$484.46, which is considerably above the average necessary to make the monthly budget. I ask you very careful consideration of the budget for December and ensuing months in order that we may pay our way as we go. If it is worth while making this building a hive of recreational, educational and physical activity, it is worth while setting ourselves to finance it in a way which will appeal to the business men of the community."

SUNDAY TRAIN SERVICE WILL BE CANCELLED

BEND FEELS EFFECT OF FUEL FAMINE

O. T. MAKES CHANGE

Will Make Connection With Train, Leaving Portland at 5:45, Carrying Dinner—Aim of Commercial Club Attained.

PORTLAND, Dec. 11.—(Reduction of passenger service cuts off Sunday trains between Bend and The Dalles. Effective Sunday at midnight, the O.-W. R. & N. will discontinue some trains, and curtail others, due to the coal shortage. Sunday service is to be eliminated between Bend and The Dalles, and on the Shaliko, Condon, and Heppner branches, among others.

The only trains affected by the order are those on the branch lines, or locals. The north coast limited on the North Bank will be eliminated after Sunday.

Special arrangements are made for Central Oregon passengers formerly connecting with the Oregon Trunk via the limited. Train No. 8 leaving here at 5:45, will now accommodate these passengers, and a dining car will be carried.

The change referred to is one of much importance to Bend travellers, the matter of securing this improvement in service having been referred to a special committee of the Commercial club at a recent meeting. Whether the connection of the Oregon Trunk with the limited is the result of the committee's activities, or whether the change is made solely on the initiative of the railroad officials, is not known.

FIRE DEPARTMENT GETS EARLY CALL

A gas explosion in a heater in the rear room of the Brobert millinery store on Wall street at 1:35 o'clock last Wednesday, blew off the stove lid and caused a red glare to show through the windows, alarming William Peck, who was passing by. He immediately turned in the alarm, and the fire department answered the call finding no flames, but a large quantity of smoke from the open heater.

RED CROSS NURSE DUTIES DEFINED

Day Nursing Not Possible, as Service Must Be Given to the Entire Community.

That many people in Bend are mistaking the functions the Red Cross nurse, was the declaration last night of Miss Margaret Brems, who occupies that position in Bend. The idea seems common, she says, that nursing by the day should be done, while this is manifestly impossible as the one nurse must serve the entire

community. The function of the Red Cross visiting nurse is primarily advisory, and for visits a nominal fee is charged to those who can afford to pay, while for those who cannot charge whatever is made. The instructions for chapters published by the General Manager of the Red Cross, specifically state

that the nurse shall not remain in the home except in unusual emergencies.
