

CITY COUNCIL REMOVES KULP

McPHERSON CHARGES INEFFICIENCY

Expected Contest Fails to Materialize—Ordinance Bill Aims at Suppression of Gambling—City to Aid Rest Room.

The first change in the Bend police department in years came last night, when on the recommendation of D. G. McPherson, chairman of the Police committee, the position of night officer, held by F. L. Kulp, was declared vacant by Mayor Eastes after a unanimous vote of instruction by the council. To replace the former incumbent, the Mayor appointed M. E. Stephenson, who has a record of two years in the army, and who held the rank of Sergeant Major at the time of his discharge. The appointment was confirmed without question.

By most of those who attended the meeting, a sharp contest over the removal of the night officer had been expected, but there was no discussion of any kind after the situation had been explained by Mr. McPherson. He declared that he had found the night officer to be lacking in efficiency, that there had been no reports made by Mr. Kulp to the police chief, and that there was an apparent lack of cooperation between the night and day officers. He said that before the first of the month he had asked Mr. Kulp to submit his resignation, that the night officer had promised to comply with the request, but that the promise had not been kept. While expressing personal regret that the removal of the officer seemed necessary, he assured the council that if the stand of the police committee were not supported he would feel that it would be useless to continue in office.

May Revoke Licenses.
Two new ordinances were introduced, one aiming at the suppression of gambling giving the mayor power to revoke licenses of pool rooms, card rooms, circuses, and shows, and the other providing for the licensing of vehicles offered for hire. Both ordinances were read for the first time, final action to be taken at a subsequent meeting.

The matter of cooperation with the Commercial club, in reopening the city rest room, was brought up, and the council voted an appropriation of \$10. It was decided that Chief of Police Nixon should move his headquarters from the fire station to the rest room.

Health Rules Asked.
Monthly reports of city officers were given, the treasurer's statement showing a balance of \$5,474.09 in the general fund, and \$69.34 in the sewer fund. Fire Chief Carlton reported the need of a fire escape at the Reid school, and stated that the hospitals in the city are in a somewhat dangerous condition. He recommended that inside rooms be used only for patients able to help themselves in case of a fire. One hundred and sixty-four house inspections were made during the month, and total damage from fire amounted to \$350. Chief of Police Nixon reported eight arrests during the month of November. Dr. Anna Ries Finley, city health officer, reported two cases of smallpox in the city, both under quarantine, recommended better sanitation at depot out-buildings, confinement of vicious dogs, and changes in the city health ordinance which will make it conform to the statute in the matter of making the city officer registrar of vital that reports of contagious diseases be turned in to this central authority. The matter was referred to the health committee and City Attorney Benson.

County Funds to Aid.
Mr. Benson, in an informal report, stated that the claims of A. A. Warner for horses impounded and sold by the city are still being negotiated, and declared that the passage of the ordinance providing a standard of heat for public buildings, which was introduced at a previous meeting, would be inadvisable. He stated that under the existing county budget it would be impossible to compel the county court to expend a certain proportion of taxes raised in Bend for road work within the city, as had been suggested in the council a month ago, but said that under the new law 70 per cent of road taxes collected in Bend must be spent here.

Mayor Eastes, in speaking of road matters, said that he had refused to sign the contract with the county court for the use of the road roller

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but that the bill for the roller would be allowed.

Fire Chief Carlton informed the council that he had been offered \$500 for the chassis of the old fire truck, and the disposal of this piece of equipment was referred to the Police and Fire committee with power to act.

A resolution condemning the Caldwell barn in Staats addition, as a public nuisance, was passed with little discussion.

In addition the usual list of claims against the city, the drawing of warrants for \$3149 to Joe Rock, \$232.22 to Frank Miller, and \$1016.96 to the United Contracting Co., for street, sidewalk, and sewer work, was ordered on the recommendation of City Engineer Robert B. Gould.

48 BABIES REPORT TO THE RED CROSS

At the close of the fifth day of Baby week in Bend, Miss Margaret Brems, Red Cross nurse, reported a total of 48 babies examined by the physicians of the city. The high mark was reached yesterday when 17 babies were brought to the Red

Cross rooms in the Bend Company building, and today 12 were examined. Examinations will be conducted from 10 to 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The week has been highly successful, except in one particular, Miss Brems states. She complains that the babies for the most part have been either normal or above normal. "They aren't the ones who need the advice or help of the Red Cross," the nurse said. "If there are any babies in Bend who are below normal, I would greatly appreciate it if their parents would bring them in tomorrow."
