

# BUDGET PLACED BEFORE PUBLIC

## RED CROSS ASKS FOR COUNTY AID

No Objections Filed to Library Appropriation—No Decisions to be Given Until End of the Session.

Deschutes county's \$134,314 budget for 1920 was placed before the public today for suggestions or objections, at a meeting of the county court which started at 10:30 o'clock this morning, but up to late this afternoon, no formal objections to any of the items going to make up the total, had been entered. Some criticism had been heard concerning the proposed appropriation of \$1,000 for the State Chamber of Commerce, but no one appeared to file a protest to this expenditure.

J. P. Keyes, Mrs. E. P. Mahaffey, and Miss Margaret Brems, representing the Red Cross, submitted a request to the court for the purchase of a car, and a \$50 a month appropriation for upkeep, to make possible the extension of the work of the Red Cross nurse, to cover the entire county, especially in regard to rural schools. It was estimated that the total amount for this purpose would be approximately \$1,600.

To answer any objections to the item of \$3,000 for library purposes, Mrs. R. S. Dart and Mrs. J. M. Lawrence, attended the morning session, but no criticisms of this item of expense was filed.

No decisions on any questions relative to expenditures were to be made by the court until the end of the meeting.

In connection with the opening of the road south, F. M. Chrisman, proprietor of the Silver Lake Stage line, submitted a request that the court wire to Klamath Falls, asking that the portion of the highway lying in Klamath county, be cleared of snow. The desired action was taken. The remainder of the road lying outside of Deschutes county, will be opened from Silver Lake, Mr. Chrisman stated.
