

SCHOOL COST SET AT \$50,000

PLANS FOR COMPLETION OF
HIGH SCHOOL SUBMITTED TO
BOARD—LONGER HOURS FOR
SECOND TERM.

That the completion of the Bend high school will cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000 was the statement made by Architect Lee A. Thomas when he appeared before the school Wednesday with tentative plans for this work should it be authorized by the board. Other school construction discussed was in regard to small portable buildings to meet the need for two more rooms, which City Superintendent Moore stated should be available to take care of the increase of pupils during the second term.

The matter of the request of Mrs. Harry Gant, a member of the local Christian Science society, that her son be excused from the weekly examinations conducted by the school nurse, was taken up, and was referred to R. S. Hamilton, attorney for the district, who was instructed to secure an opinion from Attorney-General Brown on the question.

Superintendent Moore told of the convention of educators recently held in Portland, and reported favorably on the progress being made at the Bend night school. He stated that during the next semester, the afternoon school sessions would be lengthened one half hour.

The request of A. J. Tucker that he be permitted to connect his building now in process of construction on the corner of Greenwood and Harrison, with the high school sewer, was not allowed.

ECLIPSES OF MOON WILL BE SEEN HERE
