

PAYNE CHOSEN AS PRESIDENT OF MERCHANTS

MEMBERSHIP MAKES RAPID GROWTH

OPENING HOUR SET

Retailers Agree to Start Business at 8 O'Clock in the Morning and Close at 6 O'Clock in the Evening.

Increasing interest in the Bend Merchants' association was shown Thursday night when 49 retailers, nearly three times the number to attend the first meeting, were present at the election of officers held in the city council rooms. E. L. Payne was chosen president, W. L. O'Donnell vice-president, J. B. Heyburn secretary, and Frank Inabnit treasurer.

Action on the question of opening and closing hours which was brought up several weeks ago was taken when the association, by a vote which lacked the affirmation of one member to make it unanimous, decided that except on Saturdays, mill paydays, and the days preceding holidays, stores will open at 8 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 o'clock in the evening. On the days excepted, opening hours will be the same, but stores will not close until 9 o'clock in the evenings.

A campaign of publicity to give the public the truth in regard to production costs, overhead expense, and cost of placing articles on sale, was authorized, and will be conducted through the medium of daily talks to the public. This will be in charge of a committee composed of D. G. McPherson, H. J. Power, and M. P. Cashman.

The formulation of a better and more definite business policy will be taken up at the next meeting of the association, to be held on the evening of January 22.

CANALS DAMAGED IN COLD WEATHER

Large Amount of Work Needed to Put C. O. I. Ditches in Shape After Melting of Snow.

DESCHUTES, Jan. 22.—During the recent snow and following severe weather conditions the C. O. I. Co. was unwilling to run water into its canals and laterals but turned in water for short periods and even then there were many bad breaks caused by ice jams and freezing that necessitated a great outlay of labor by the company and volunteer work by settlers.

The turning on of water is a necessity at frequent intervals to let the settlers fill their cisterns with water for stock and domestic purposes.
This vicinity has recently enjoyed a real estate boom and many farms have changed hands between here and Bend and as a result the school attendance has gone from some twenty odd scholars to an enrollment of nearly 40 and the directors faced the necessity of employing another teacher.

The school board called a special election and the settlers voted to tax themselves enough to raise about five hundred dollars to provide funds to buy more desks and pay an additional teacher.

The school house has two rooms already as the community was far sighted enough to provide for this contingency when they built the school some time ago.

One of the school directors having left the community and resigned a new one was elected. Mr. D. A. Slaughter is the new director elected last week.
