DESCHUTES FARMERS NOW ON PHONE LINE

DESCHUTES, Jan. 25.—For some time past there has been a farmers telephone line extending east of Bend toward Prineville that was originally formed by Messrs Boardman MacLean and Scheaffer. Recently agitation for an extension of this line down the Deschutes road was started which finally resulted in a meeting of the stockholders of the Farmers Telephone Co. and a vote to take in fourteen new subscribers at thirty dollars per share. At the present time a line of poles has been set where needed and trees trimmed so that the line is ready for the wire which is being hung. Nearly everyone on the east Deschutes road will soon be connected with Bend including the C. O. I. Co. at Deschutes, on this new line. Putting in these poles is an expensive affair for the farmers at first but afterward will only call for a small outlay for upkeep and \$3.00 per year for switchboard service in Bend.

The affairs of the Deschutes school district are finally again straightened and we have now two teachers in charge of the school. Recently Mr. Hartwig of this neighborhood traded for the bull calf of the famous 12 gallon Burt Holstein cow now owned by Mr. D. A. Slaughter and farmers of this neighborhood are glad to know that this fine bull will remain in this vicinity.

Mrs. R. N. Sefton has signed a contract and taken charge of the first four grades of the school consisting of twenty pupils. Mrs. Kanoff has the 4 higher classes consisting of 17 pupils. Two of the eighth grade pupils took the examination and passed a few days ago.
