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CONCRETE PIPE INDUSTRY HERE IS UNDER WAY
NEW FACTORY STARTS PRODUCTION
STEADY RUN ASSURED
Over \$400 Worth of Product Put Out Daily by \$15,000 Plant—Steam Curing Process Prolongs Life of Pipe.

To supply the needs of Bend and Central Oregon for a time proof, water proof pipe, the model factory of the Concrete Pipe Co. with headquarters in Portland, is now in operation here just to the east of the tracks, and is turning out 500 feet of eight inch pipe per day. The product now being manufactured is to fill the immediate needs of sewer construction now under way in Bend, but within a short time, additional machinery will arrive for the making of reinforced culvert pipe. Eighty feet a day of this type can be put out, and the value of the factory's daily output will exceed \$400. Seven men are now employed, but the full crew will number 11. The plant is now in charge of C. H. Bullen and Phil Easterday, members of the company, but it will soon be turned over to a superintendent. The total outlay represented in the factory is given as \$15,000.

The process used in the making of ordinary sewer pipe was developed by Mr. Bullen, and involves the use of an automatic feed with a machine tamper which strikes 400 blows a minute, 75 pounds to each stroke. A fairly wet mixture is used, in order that the pipe may later be impervious to water.

Special Process Used.
The pipe is taken to one of the seven steam chambers in the factory. The chamber remains dry for two hours while the concrete sets slightly, then the steam is turned on, increasing in intensity until at the end of 48 hours, a water-saturated vapor is completing the kiln-curing. The steam process in curing, Mr. Bullen states, not only takes the place of six or seven days of exposure to the air, but makes a harder, more cohesive stone. After two days of drying in the yards, the pipe is ready for use.

In the manufacture of the reinforced pipe, a liquid concrete mixture is poured into the mold which already contains a heavy wire screen, which becomes the skeleton of the pipe. This system is one perfected by Mr. Easterday, and the pipe is used where an unusual pressure must be withstood.
Later, other articles may be manufactured by the company, although pipe will remain the staple product. It is the intention of the company to operate at the same capacity the year round, and to avoid any layoff, care will be taken not to increase the output beyond the demand.
Both Mr. Easterday and Mr. Bul-

len express themselves as being most favorably impressed with the quality of material which is available here. "Before we came in here, we were told that we might have difficulty in getting the right kind of sand and gravel, but we have located practically unlimited supplies, and of excellent quality," Mr. Bullen said.
