

# MUST PURCHASE WATER RIGHTS

## DECISION GIVEN BY GOVERNMENT

Rights Must Be Bought for All Irrigable Acres Before Patent Will Be Issued—C. O. I. Lands Are Affected.

That action on segregation lists Nos. 9 and 10, of the Central Oregon Irrigation Company's lands, will be taken in the near future, appears in a letter from the Desert Land Board to the company. "Action" is understood to mean the passing of the lands to patent. Information to this effect was given State Engineer Cupper on his recent visit to Washington. Patents are not to issue, however, to any of the tracts containing excess acreage.

The letter is as follows:

"While Mr. Cupper was in Washington recently he made inquiry relative to the present status of the State's application for patent for the lands included in lists Nos. 9 and 10, and learned that action would be taken immediately upon receipt of Mr. Archibald's report which is due in the near future.

"Mr. Cupper was advised however, that patent would not issue covering any of the tracts containing excess acreage. According to Mr. Archibald's report made in 1918 the following tracts contain excess acreage.

"It is therefore requested that you check over the list and advise at your earliest convenience in order that proper evidence may be filed with the Department to assure the tract being patented at this time."

## PAYS \$100 FOR HAVING LIQUOR

### CAUSTIC VERBAL ENCOUNTER BETWEEN DEFENDANT AND POLICE CHIEF, MARKS CONNARN HEARING.

Pleading guilty to a charge of having liquor in his possession, Dr. J. H. Connarn was fined \$200 and costs in city court Saturday evening, half of the fine being remitted by Judge D. H. Peoples during good behaviour. On Dr. Connarn's statement that Louis Colvin, arrested with him in his office early Friday morning, had nothing to do with the liquor, the case against the second defendant was dismissed.

Rapid fire repartee of caustic nature featured the latter part of the hearing when Dr. Connarn expressed his displeasure at the fact that Chief of Police Nixon had fixed his bail at \$200 at the time of his arrest.

"You know I could have put you in jail without any bail," Chief Nixon remarked.

"Yes, and if I told all I know about you, you'd be in jail, too," was the dentist's rejoinder.

"If you think you've got anything on me, go ahead and tell it," the police chief replied, but the defendant declined, declaring that he was "too good a sport." The conversation was interrupted at this point by the court, and Dr. Connarn was permitted to draw his check for \$100.

A few minutes after court had adjourned, Dr. Connarn returned, asking that the quart of liquor taken from him be destroyed. He was assured that it would be kept for 10 days and that at the end of that period he could witness its destruction.
