DEBATERS WIN IN TWO CITIES

Debaters of the Bend high school won a double victory Friday when the affirmative team consisting of Paul Reynolds and Julia Kennedy won in Bend, and the negative team composed of William Williams and Hugh Kelly, won from Redmond teams on the question, "Resolved, that the United States should ratify no treaty by which China is despoiled of the Shantung peninsula." The victory of Coach Johnson's proteges was due in both instances to their superiority in argument in the first presentation of the question. At Redmond honors were even on rebuttal, and in Bend the local debaters had the worst of it in delivery.

Peruvian Rain Tree.

It is estimated that one of the Peruvian rain trees will on the average yield nine gallons of water each day. In a field of an area of one kilometer square, that is, 5,250 feet each way, can be grown 10,000 trees separated from each other by twenty-five meters. This plantation produces daily 395,000 liters of water.

DRILL TOWER TO BE BUILT

Within the next few days work will be started on the construction of a drill tower, to be used in the training of the members of the Bend volunteer fire department, that they may be in readiness to deal successfully with any condition which might arise during a fire.

The tower will be erected on city property adjacent to the lots now occupied by the fire station. It will be a four wall building, unlike most drill towers, which consist of one wall only. It is planned to build the walls 16 feet wide and 46 feet in height, allowing for four floors, the first 16 feet high, the next 26 feet, the third 36 and the fourth at 46 feet. Two windows will be built above each floor, and a flat roof will protect the structure from the weather.
