IMPLEMENTS TO BE CARRIED

PIONEER TO HANDLE
J. I. CASE LINE

Need Is Seen in Central Oregon
for Better Farm Equipment—
General Supply Will Be
Available.

"There is a great need for better farming implements in Central Oregon according to our impressions," says H. S. Royce of the Pioneer Garage, who recently signed a contract to handle the J. I. Case line of farm implements for the territory south of Redmond to the California line. "Many farmers have asked about the matter of farm implements. They seem desirous of obtaining better equipment now that they are getting on their feet and can see their way clear to handle better machinery. Then, too, there is a demand for it. More land is under cultivation. More stock is being raised on the irrigated ranches throughout the entire Cen-

tral Oregon country. That is why we have decided that we shall carry a full line of implements."

There is not a great demand for heavy machinery, according to Mr. Royce, but there is a growing demand for binders, mowers, plows, garden implements, hay balers, feed cutters, ensilage cutters, rakes, seeders etc.

Another matter of importance in county road affairs was brought up when owners of property on the Bend to Burns highway, submitted in writing an offer to donate right of way if the highway within Deschutes county is laid out in the present year. W. P. Dorn, J. M. Hayes, E. D. Lalonde, Alfred Incognito, James Greino, and H. Marchand were the signers. In connection with this, the court will suggest to the state highway commission that the county will bear the expense of preliminary clearing on this stretch of road pro-

viding the state will have the survey made and will furnish the machine for pulling trees and sage.
