## Y. M. C. A. MEMBERS IN ANNUAL MEETING

### GROWTH IS SKETCHED

Need for Building Up of Membership Is Told by Secretary L. W. Trickey in Report of Work Accomplished.

As the chief order of business at the first annual meeting of the membership of the Bend Industrial Y. M. C. A., held last Wednesday at the gymnasium, a new board of management was elected, numbering 15, to have charge of the affairs of the association for the next year. The chairman of the board is to be chosen later. Five men were elected from the employees of each of the two mills and five more from among Bend business and professional men, a final tabulation showing the following selections: Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co., M. H. Wagner, H. H. Henderson, Percy Chase, Steve Steidl, and Hans Slagvold; The Shevlin-Hixon Company, C. C. Burns, V. Agren, James Clifford, Jack Mahoney, and Norval Springer; City, T. H. Foley, L. K. Shephard, Lloyd Douthitt, Dr. L. W. Gatchell, and Rev. J. Edgar Purdy.

Preceding the business, dinner prepared by a committee of the Civic Improvement League, including Mrs. Ralph Spencer, Mrs. Frank Toomey, Mrs. A. Lessing, Mrs. R. W. Nicholson, Mrs. J. F. Arnold, Mrs. M. Ayers, and Mrs. C. P. Niswonger, was served to half a hundred members by Miss Eva Harker, Miss Evelyn Carlson, Miss Alberta Dryden, Miss Ella Dews, Miss Agnes Campbell, Miss Nora McClay, and Miss Ida Benson, instructors in the Bend schools. Musical selections during the dinner hour were furnished by Miss Vera Thorburn, Miss Bonnie Scribner, Dr. R. D. Ketchum, and Charles Wilson.

Growth of "Y" Sketched in his report on association work

Secretary L. W. Trickey urged that the important thing to be considered at present in the life of the organization is the building up of the membership list until finances will allow the increasing of association activities. "I trust that every man here will boost for the organization, realizing that we have just begun to start," he said. "With a big and enthusiastic membership, a fine piece of community service can be eventually established."

That the association has made great progress toward the attainment of the community center ideal, he showed in mentioning that the gymnasium building is now headquarters for the county library, the boy scouts, the camp fire girls and the day nursery. "The Y. M. C. A., in taking over the operation of the building at a time when it was heavily in debt, and when the membership had declined almost to the vanishing point, faced a somewhat difficult situation," he said. "To be exact, I think there were exactly 23 paying members when I looked over the records for the first time. After the full amount of the building debt had been pledged, things took on a new aspect, and members have since joined at an average rate of 50 or 60 a month, so that we now have a paid up membership of 321, including men, women, boys and girls. Sixty of these are family memberships, representing at least double that number, who are connected with this institution."

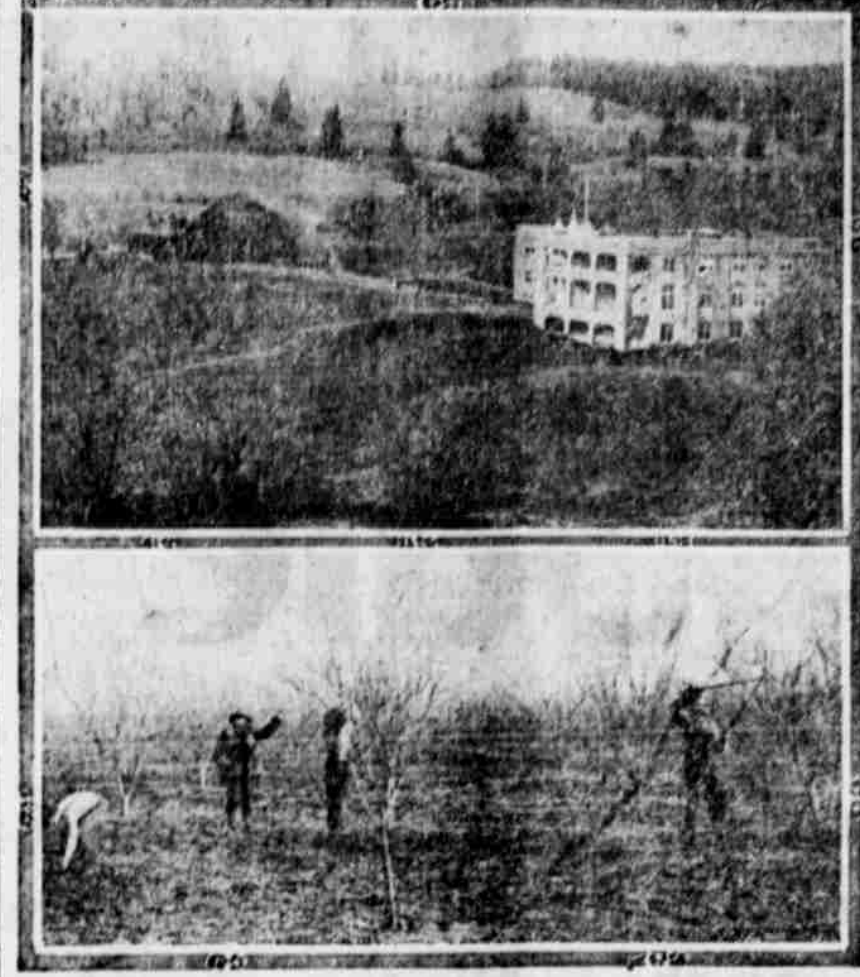

# SALVATION ARMY PLANS BOYS AND GIRLS INDUSTRIAL AND AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL

One of the big phases of the work the Salvation Army is doing in Oregon to prevent the ills of wrong teaching and poverty and to strike at the root of the despair and grief found in the cities, is the training and care of dependent boys and girls. One of the items of the budget to be raised for the Salvation Army work in Oregon provides for the purchase of the Bishop Scott school at North Yamhill as an industrial and agricultural school where neglected kiddies will be educated and made efficient workers so that when they go out into the world they will be an asset to society and not a charge upon the communities of which they will be members. The 1000 acre farm has a walnut grove and other orchards, and, under proper care of agricultural experts who will teach the boys, its productivity will go far toward making the school self supporting. The school is in no sense to be a penal or reformatory institution but on the other hand it is intended to provide sound vocational education for youngsters who, without it, are on the road to bad citizenship.

## OUTDOOR BANQUET TO BE JUNE 1

Trout Course to Be Feature—Nearly 150 Expected to See State Movie Films and hear Addresses on Protection.

Coordination of plans for propagation and protection of fish and game in Deschutes county will be effected in Bend on the evening of June 1, when the first annual banquet of the Bend Rod & Gun club will be held. N. G. Jacobson, president of the organization, announced Saturday. The best of the moving picture films taken under the direction of former State Biologist Finley will be shown and a list of speakers, to include several state officials, will be made up within a few days. More than 100 Deschutes county men are now members of the club and it is expected that nearly 150 will be in attendance at the banquet.

A trout course will be a feature of the dinner, Mr. Jacobson states, and, during the two days preceding the big event, the club's most proficient anglers will be sent to the best fishing streams to obtain an abundant supply. It is suggested by H. McDonald, the new game warden for Central Oregon, that the banquet take the form of a camp supper, and this idea will be carried out if the weather permits, speeches and movie films to compose the indoor program afterward.
