

# PENALTY FIXED FOR PROFITTEERS ON NEW PLAN

### CRUCIFIXION TO BE ORDERED WITH WEEK'S TIME, SAYS ORGANIZER OF WORLD LEAGUE, IS ADJUDGED INSANE.

Within a week's time, the World Consumers' and Producers' league will take over the earth, choose Louis Hill manager and Woodrow Wilson president, and will crucify all profiteers and murderers, P. E. Holderman, until recently a resident of Prineville and Redmond, announced here today. The work is to start in Deschutes county, where the preliminary organization has already been effected, and a strong feature will be the reclamation of waste land.

Mr. Holderman is national organizer for the league, commencing active work early in May, when in answer to his mother's prayer, the Lord appeared to him in a vision. The scheme of organization, which includes making Washington, D. C., world headquarters, was revealed to him at that time, even the names of prospective committeemen in the vicinity of Deschutes being given to him.

Mr. Holderman has been under observation since Saturday, when he was brought to Bend from Redmond. He was sent to the state insane hospital at Salem Tuesday. Local authorities hold to the theory that worry and lack of proper food are at least contributory to the man's present derangement.

Until shortly before noon it had been thought that he might be taken by relatives for private care, in the Willamette valley, but while waiting in Sheriff Roberts' office, he suddenly seized his four months old baby boy, brought to Bend from Corvallis by his wife, and rushed from the building. He was re-located at the Cozy hotel.

Mr. Holderman had been working toward the formation of the Consumers' and Producers' league for some time, and has advertised extensively in Bend and Redmond papers for waste land anywhere, in any quantity.

### SCHEDULE ADOPTED BY BOARD AS RESULT OF COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION, IS BASED ON LENGTH OF SERVICE.

A schedule for the salaries of teachers in the Bend schools, based on a set of qualifications adopted by the board two weeks ago on a committee report, was established last week when the directors of District No. 1 met in regular session. Under this schedule, salaries are based on the teaching experience of the individual instructor, both here and in other schools, and because of the difference in the length of these services, variations in the compensation given the different teachers will be many and of rather wide range.
