

PUPILS PLEASE LARGE CROWDS WITH OPERETTA

ARTISTIC PRODUCTION GIVEN

ORIENT IS PICTURED

Temple Scenes, Dances, Solos and Chorus Selections, Given Under Direction of Miss Scribner, Tell Story of East.

What beyond doubt is the most artistic production of its kind ever seen in Bend was given on Friday when the augmented Girls' Glee club, assisted by other pupils of the city schools, appeared before a capacity house at the gymnasium in the two-act operetta, "In India," put on under the direction of Miss Bonnie Scribner, head of the music department of the Bend schools. Special scenery, built by the manual training classes and decorated by Miss Scribner and Miss Agnes Campbell to reproduce an Indian temple, was used, and Oriental costumes, featuring the barem idea in feminine wearing apparel, followed the Eastern dress with remarkable fidelity. Instrumental music was furnished by the high school orchestra. Chorus work was unusually good and special comment should be made regarding the "snake dance" as performed by Kathryn Day, and the appearance of five "monkeys," Spencer Ketchum, Jack Staats, Gerald McCann, Woodson Bennett and Gerald McConnell, who squatted about on the stage, industriously examining themselves for fleas after the manner of the monkey tribe. Frances Heyburn capably took the part of the village scold, while Mildred Klein appeared to advantage in the leading role.

The operetta tells the story of Meerah, the most beautiful girl in the village of Fishni, on the Ganges, who is chosen to become a temple dancing girl. She believes herself to be an orphan, which is one of the qualifications necessary for her

entrance into the temple as a dancer, but during the festival day of Abu, the flower god, a beggar appears who proves to be Meerah's mother. How-Now, the village scold, proves to be the only remaining orphan available, and she is carried off to fill Meerah's place, while the reunited mother and daughter join the maidens in celebrating the festival day.

Music Pleases.

Twenty-one vocal and two instrumental numbers made up the greater part of the operetta, Miss Klein as Meerah, Gladys Sather as Simla, the village pet; Miss Heyburn as How-Now, and Nellie Leslie as Veerah, the beggar, appearing in solos which were well received.

The roles of three old women from the temple, Hear-No-Evil, See-No-Evil and Speak-No-Evil, were played by Margaret Inabnit, Bessie Smith and Virginia Colver, respectively, while the chorus of Indian maidens of the village of Fishni was composed of Alice Stockman, Marion Sather, Jessie Stookey, Jeanette Keyes, Emogene Richards, Luella Halvorson, Leora Connarn, Louise Inabnit, Helen Downing, Dora Gillis, Kathryn Day, Marjorie Baird, Winona Kleinfelt, Helen McLaughlin and Lola Whitmore. Dorothy Taylor, Kathryn Addink, Alice Holmes and Viva Stephens represented roses, and Dorothy McConnell, Bernice Hand, Erma Lehrman and Mary Reynolds were poppies. Lloyd Lamplig and Richard Connarn were efficient custodians of the temple.

CUT IN RATES AGAIN IS MADE

BASIC CHARGE ON DWELLINGS OUTSIDE FIRE ZONE CUT, 15 CENTS—EXPOSURE CHARGES REMAIN THE SAME.

Another insurance reduction has been made by the Oregon Rating bureau, Mayor J. A. Eastes was advised Thursday the basic rate on residences outside the fire zone in Bend having been cut from 75 cents to 60 cents per \$100. The reduction however, is not nearly so great as it would seem at first glance, Mr. Eastes declares, for the exposure rate remains unchanged at 50 cents. In order to conform to reductions made elsewhere in the city, exposures should be charged for on a basis of 15 cents, Mr. Eastes believes, and he will continue his fight with the rating bureau to secure this cut.

SERVICES HELD FOR CHARLES E. STREET

Funeral services were held this morning from the Niswonger undertaking parlors under the auspices of the local Oddfellows lodge, of which he was a member, for Charles Edward Street, who died at his home in this city, aged 55 years and nine months. Cancer, from which he has suffered for several years, was the cause of his death.

Mr. Street was born in Louisiana, but for the past nine years had made his home in and near Bend. For several years he was mail carrier from La Pine to Crescent, and had many friends and acquaintances in Central Oregon.
