

TWENTY-THREE WIN DIPLOMAS

CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY SHOWN

Commencement Address Delivered
by Dr. James H. Gilbert Points
to Education to Combat
Enemies of Democracy.

Twenty-three members of the class of 1920 of the Bend high school, formally completed their four year course Thursday when commencement exercises were held at the gymnasium in the presence of more than 600 parents and friends. Following the custom which has found favor in Bend, the seniors were attired in grey caps and gowns.

Dr. James H. Gilbert, of the department of economics of the University of Oregon, delivered the graduation address. Speaking on the subject, "Education and Civic Responsibility," he declared that education is the greatest safeguard of American democracy, and warned against what he considers the two greatest dangers confronting that democracy—propensity to act on impulse, and the tendency to place selfish class and sectional interests above those of the state and nation.

Reds Are Scored.
Since war was declared in Europe in 1914, Dr. Gilbert pointed out, the United States can hardly be accused of acting on impulse. Of what has appeared to be the outgrowth of the war, bolshevism, he said: It is the mood of childhood expressed in politics; its followers want to do nothing and undo everything. It is a splendid example of the insane impulse.

"Education trains the mind to ask the reason for action. The more men and women of such training a town or city has, the nearer is the community panic proof. Let us find a rational solution for every problem."

The speaker referred again to bolshevism as an example of class ascendancy, and domination of military by military authority over a people 85 per cent illiterate. "I believe that America will repudiate class rule," he said. "What we do want

instead, is the leadership of the intelligent and fit. With this, the government of the whole people shall not perish from the earth."

Class is Large.

Dr. Gilbert's speech followed selections by the high school orchestra, and a difficult but well handled vocal solo by Miss Genevieve Wagner. At the close of the address City Superintendent R. W. Moore presented the senior class, taking the opportunity of sketching the general plan of work on which their graduation is based. He praised the high degree of cooperation accorded by the members of the faculty in grade and high school alike, and predicted that the progress of the Bend schools has only begun.

Diplomas were presented by R. W.
