### JOIN HANDS

The recent announcement concerning the expected beginning of construction of the Benham falls project spoke only of the North unit. No mention was made of any of the other three units and, since practically all the work preliminary to the present stage has been done by the north unit directors, this was to have been expected. For six years these Jefferson county men have made the irrigation of their section the work of their lives. They have been for irrigation in general, but for the irrigation of the North unit lands in particular. They have now made a contract that has to do with their own special interests, and quite properly so. Is it not now time for some activity on behalf of the other units of the Deschutes project, so that all features of the great scheme may go ahead together?

The irrigation scheme known as the Deschutes project is the result of a cooperative survey made by the state of Oregon and the United States in the summer of 1914. The report on this survey outlined a plan for the irrigation of the Jefferson county section, designated as the North unit, the completion of the North Canal project, called in the report the South unit; the extension of the Tumalo project over a section named the West unit, and the reclamation of the old Benham falls segregation, lying east from Bend and renamed the East unit. As our readers probably know, water for this extensive development scheme was to be provided by the surplus, or winter, flow of the Deschutes, impounded at Benham falls and at Crane prairie, about to be reported as suitable reservoir sites.

Because of its district organization the North unit is the only one

of these four in shape to proceed independently toward the desired goal. The north canal segregation is still withheld from entry, awaiting irrigation developments. So, likewise, is that portion of the former Benham falls segregation not homesteaded when the tract was thrown open in 1917. The Tumalo extension, or West unit, we understand, is largely in private ownership, but has few or no settlers and no organization to express its desires and needs.

Is it not now time for some authority to step in and see if some arrangement cannot be made for the inclusion in the greater project of the untouched segregations? With the matter so well under way, the Reclamation service ought to be interested on behalf of the South and East units and the West unit should be brought in as well. Each of these is to be watered, if at all, from the Benham falls reservoir. Now is the time for those interested in them to join hands with the North unit officials and have all units go forward together.
