

# RATE PETITION ORDER IS SENT

### PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION DISMISSES APPLICATION OF C. O. I. COMPANY FOR HIGHER CHARGES.

Closing the case of the application filed last year by the Central Oregon Irrigation company for permission to levy higher maintenance charges against the settlers on the project, copies of an order signed by the members of the state public service commission were received June 17 by the firm of De Armond & Erskine, attorneys for the settlers. The opinion, which forms a part of the order, declares that the state cannot, without the consent of the settlers, alter the rates to be charged.

Rates now in effect are 80 cents and \$1 per acre, while those asked by the company were \$2.50 per acre.

In the hearing held early in April before the commission in Redmond, the attorneys representing the settlers objected to the taking of testimony, on the grounds that the commission had no jurisdiction. The objection is upheld in the commission's order dismissing the application.

# BIG VOTE GIVEN BEND CANDIDATE

H. J. Overturf of this city Monday received his official notification of nomination by the republican party for the office of state representative. With the notification were filed returns on the primary election, as far as this position was concerned, showing that Mr. Overturf received 3053 votes, Denton G. Burdick 2621, and H. A. Brattain 1952.

# EXPORT COMPANY ACCUSES EMPLOYEE

### E. J. Bruns Charged With Embodiment of \$374, Intended For Payment of Freight on Juniper.

On a charge of embezzlement, a warrant is out for the arrest of E. J. Bruns, for more than a year past a resident of Bend. The complaint on which the warrant is based was drawn up on information furnished by the American-Pacific Export Co., of which Bruns was local representative in the buying and shipping of juniper timber.

It is alleged that on May 15, Bruns received \$374 to pay the freight charges on a car of juniper from Bend to Springfield, Missouri, but that he diverted the amount to his own use. He is thought to have left for Everett, Washington.

# GAME OFFICIAL FIRST AT LAKE

### McDONALD GETS TOW WHEN SNOW HALTS

#### Road Now Open to Crater, He Believes—Announces Closing of Upper Half of Elk Lake Beginning on July 15.

Claiming the distinction of being the first autoist to reach Crater lake this season, District Game Warden H. McDonald arrived in Bend Thursday night, ending a three-day official trip into the southern part of his territory. He reports the roads on both sides of the lake in excellent condition, with the exception of a stretch of about 10 miles north of La Pine. Two of the five miles between the government camp and the rim of Crater lake were open when he left Friday morning, and the entire distance can probably be traversed by autos now, he believes, as a force of men with plows and scrapers was working at top speed to clear the way.

Mr. McDonald's car stalled in deep snow above Whitehorse canyon as he neared the lake from the Medford side, and he was towed for a short distance by Alex Sparrow, national park superintendent. He had no further difficulties.

# DOG TAG IS SALARY OF BEND EXECUTIVE

### Brass Check Awarded by Custom to Mayor Eastes, Is Only Compensation For Year's Work.

One octagonal brass dog tag, vintage of 1920, was received today by Mayor J. A. Eastes, representing his salary in full for the present year. The tag will decorate the neck of Rex, the setter of uncertain lineage who guards the mayor's office.

Although the charter makes no provision for compensation for the city executive, custom has it that the mayor shall not be required to pay a dog license, and his "salary" was turned over to Mr. Eastes this morning.

# CLOUDS HOLD DOWN JUNE HEAT RECORD

### Mercury Rises to 92 Degrees, However, And Farmers Predict Unusual Growing Season.

One of the hottest June days on record here was experienced by Bend Monday, when summer came with a rush and sent the mercury up to 92 degrees. Ninety degrees was reached by a few minutes after noon, but the opportune arrival of a few well placed clouds kept the maximum at 8:30 o'clock rather lower than had been expected.

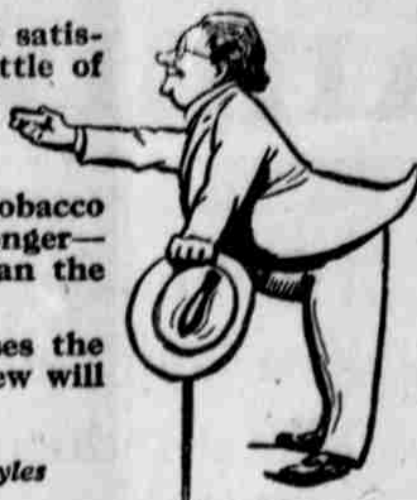

# BAD CONDITIONS IN RESTAURANTS FOUND

### Pastime Pays Fine of \$10, While Royal Cafe Man Parts With \$50 And Receives Much Advice.

Charged with operating a restaurant under unclean, unhealthy and unsanitary conditions, Harry Moiser pleaded guilty in justice court Monday and paid a fine of \$10. A similar charge against Roy Southworth, associated with Bolser in the management of the lunch counter in the Pastime, was dismissed. The complaints were the result of the activities of W. B. Duncan, food and dairy inspector, who has been working in and near Bend for several days.

Another complaint of a similar nature was that against George W. Schramm of the Royal cafe, alleged to be in much worse condition than the Pastime. A \$100 fine was levied against Schramm and half the penalty remitted by Judge Eastes on condition that instructions for an immediate cleanup were carried out to the letter.
