

GRAIN AND FRUIT CROPS IN WEST TO BE LESS THAN 1919

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin)

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—Grain and fruit crops in western states will fall short of the yields of a year ago, according to a resume of business and agricultural conditions which has been issued by the federal reserve bank here, covering the states of Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

Frosts, cold weather and deficient precipitation caused crops of the district to be retarded from three to four weeks. The winter wheat crop in the seven states is now estimated at \$1,164,000 bushels, as compared with \$1,051,000 bushels a year ago, the bank's bulletin declares. If weather conditions are favorable during the remainder of the growing season, however, the increase in the spring wheat crop will compensate for approximately half of this deficiency. It is estimated, predictions indicating this crop will amount to 50,277,000 bushels, compared with 45,425,000 bushels last year. The net decrease in all wheat

grown in the district is placed at 5,085,000 bushels.

"In the Pacific Northwest," says the bank's report, "the prune and cherry crops are estimated at from 55 to 60 per cent of those of 1919; the apple crop at from 50 to 70 per cent, and the pear crop at 50 per cent of that of 1919. The Yakima valley, Washington, peach crop will not exceed 200 cars, as compared with 2200 in 1919. The prospects are that the loganberry crop of Western Washington will not exceed 40 per cent, raspberries, 75 per cent, and strawberries 85 per cent of normal."

"The labor situation has improved somewhat during the last month," says the bulletin. "In and around Seattle, there is a slight excess of both skilled and unskilled labor. In Western Washington there is a considerable shortage of unskilled railroad help. Elsewhere throughout the district there is a shortage of farm laborers, although not as severe as was anticipated a month ago."

CRESCENT FOREST FIRES CONTROLLED

Largest Checked Before Area Had Exceeded 40 Acres—Last Night's Lightning May Cause More.

Returning last night from Crescent, where, with Ranger Ben Smith, he was sent the day before to aid in handling the forest fire situation, Assistant Supervisor W. O. Harriman reported that the two fires remaining out of eight, started by lightning, are completely under control. They were checked before either had exceeded an area of 40 acres.

More fires are looked for before the end of the week as the result of the electric storm, flashes from which could be seen to the south last night.

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BUDGET'S FATE IS SETTLED BY 21 BEND VOTES

\$105,640 EXPENDITURE IS ENDORSED

MAJORITY IS ONLY 5

School District Officials and Election Board Constitute 11 of Voters—Nordeen Is New Chairman of Directors.

In a city, the inhabitants of which, says the 1920 census, number 5415, a total of 21 voters on June 30 decided, at the special Bend school district election yesterday, the fate of a \$105,640 budget. It passed on a vote of 12 to 7, the enabling measure allowing more than a six per cent advance over the tax of the previous year, passing, 12 to 8. One ballot out of the 21 was thrown out, being improperly marked. The election was held from 2 o'clock in the afternoon to 7 o'clock in the evening at the high school building.

Of the voters, six were members, either active or retiring, of the school board—H. E. Nordeen, J. P. Keyes, L. M. Foss, Mrs. E. M. Thompson, C. A. Hayden and R. W. Sawyer, and three—Mrs. E. P. Brostertous, Mrs. P. B. Johnson and E. D. Gilson—were members of the election board. City Superintendent S. W. Moore and Mrs. Moore voted and the district clerk, J. Alton Thompson, also cast his ballot. The other voters were: L. A. Shaw, Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Frame, Marguerite E. Moran, Lydia L. Kelly, J. J. Klein, H. McMunn, William A. Harris and James A. Brown.

The budget, as originally advertised, provided for \$95,640, but the meeting of the electors, held immediately after a meeting of the board, at which Mr. Hayden, newly elected member of the board, was sworn in by Mr. Sawyer, retiring director, authorized the addition of \$10,000, half the amount being for a building fund and half for a sinking fund for outstanding indebtedness.

At the evening meeting of the board, following the election, it was voted to fence the Carroll Acres school grounds, to keep jackrabbits from trespassing on the lawn and to keep children from venturing in the way of speeding cars on the highway. The Owl Paint Shop was awarded the contract for \$340 for painting the Carroll Acres school.

Mr. Nordeen was elected chairman of the board for the coming school year and District Clerk Thompson was reelected. City Superintendent Moore was authorized to attend the National Educational association convention in Salt Lake City this week.

FISH TAKEN IN ILLEGAL MANNER

Dynamite Used By Some in Procuring Trout, and Spearing Is Reported to, Declares Warden.
