JULY BEST GROWING SEASON SINCE 1916

Although Bend had 4 of an inch rainfall during the month of July, according to the report of the cooperative meteorological observer's record, 21 days of the month were bright and sunshiny, with six partly cloudy, and four cloudy. The chief precipitation was on July 13 and 20.

The hottest weather of the year was recorded on July 27 and 28,

with 96 degrees on each of these days. There were no frosts, but nights were pleasantly cool, the minimum varying from 36 degrees on the 12th and 23rd, to 53 degrees, the latter mark coming on the 29th. The greatest daily range of temperature was 55 degrees on the 27th, and the least daily range 13 degrees on the 12th.

The month represented the best growing season that Central Oregon has seen since 1916.
