

# C. O. I. SETTLERS DEMAND DEEDS

### SUITS BROUGHT BY IRRIGATION COMPANY TO FORFEIT RIGHTS FOR LACK OF PAYMENT, RESISTED IN COURT.

For the first time in the history of the Central Oregon Irrigation project, as far as is known, settlers are making a determined fight to prevent forfeiture of water rights and contracts for non-payment of fees to the company. The contest is being made in a series of suits being heard here this week by Circuit Judge T. E. J. Duffy, in which G. W. Hoeh, C. W. Hoeh and O. C. Cardwell are defendants.

The defense is based on the contention that the company has failed to live up to its contracts by not reclaiming the land. Because of this, it is argued, part of the various tracts in question have not been patented, and the company is unable to furnish deeds. The defendants maintain that the company has no right to forfeit their contracts until it has lived up to the terms of its own.

In the Hoeh suits, W. H. Wilson, of the Dalles, who appears for all the defendants, was assisted by De Armond & Erskine of Bend as counsel. Jesse Stearns represents the plaintiff.

# MANY HEAR OF TEACHER NEED

### EIGHT APPLICATIONS RECEIVED IN TWO DAYS, FOLLOWING PUBLICATION OF STORY REGARDING SHORTAGE.

No less than eight applications for teaching positions in the Bend schools have been received in the last few days from various parts of the state by J. Alton Thompson, clerk of the district school board. At least one-half of the applicants are normal school graduates and their experience in teaching ranges from one to nine years. Mr. Thompson says. All are women and one asks a position as high school principal.

All letters of application mention the shortage of teachers in this section and Mr. Thompson believes the sudden interest to be due to publication in a Portland Sunday paper of a news story featuring the need of the local schools for instructors.

# DANIELS UNWILLING TO RETURN TO BEND

### Man Arrested in Santa Maria, Cal. Changes Mind and Will Fight Extradition—Would Settle Case.

C. A. Daniels, wanted here on a charge of larceny by bailee, who, when arrested in Santa Maria, Cal., last week, expressed his willingness to waive extradition, is now fighting a transfer into Oregon, according to word received here by Deputy Sheriff August Anderson from Sheriff S. E. Roberts, who is now in Santa Maria.

While fighting extradition, Daniels is attempting to settle the case by payment of the amounts he is alleged to have appropriated.

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# First Habeas Corpus Proceedings In County End With Court's Order To Release Man Wanted In Idaho

The first habeas corpus proceedings ever started in Deschutes county, were commenced here Thursday, when Coroner C. P. Niswonger served a demand on Acting Sheriff August A. Anderson for the release of C. L. Peterman, of Twin Falls, Idaho, arrested here on telegraphic instructions from that city in which a charge of embezzlement was made. The case as far as local authorities are concerned, came to a close Friday, afternoon, when Circuit Judge T. E. J. Duffy granted the application and ordered the release of the prisoner. The case was outlined in court on Friday, H. H. De Armond appearing for the prisoner, producing Peterman and his wife to testify in regard to the purchase of an auto truck, failure to make

monthly payments on which is the basis of the Idaho complaint. Both declared that they had made arrangements with the seller according to which they were to be allowed to leave Idaho during the summer, with their truck. In delivering his opinion, Judge Duffy laid stress on the fact that instructions from Idaho were not in the form of a warrant, were signed by the sheriff at Twin Falls, and that there was nothing to show that a telegraphic warrant had been authorized by the court in Idaho. He noted further that the contract for the purchase of the truck had been entered into by Mrs. Peterman rather than by the husband. Because of these reasons, he held that further detention of the prisoner would not be justified.

# BOY SCOUT CAMP TO START ON AUGUST 23

### Outing at Elk Lake Will End With Coming of School—Junior Squad For Boys Under 12 Planned.

The long-planned Boy Scout summer camp at Elk lake has been definitely fixed for from August 23 to the beginning of school. This is approximately one month later than originally planned. More than one-half of the Boy Scouts are employed at the mills and about town and if the camp were established at the present time, these boys would be confronted with the dilemma of either missing the encampment or of inconveniencing their employers by absenting themselves in the middle of the working season. Under the new plan these boys can resign their employment 5, 10 or 15 days before school, go into camp, and return, fresh and enthusiastic, for school. All boys over 12 years old will be admitted to the camp by making application to Scout Master Purdy before August 20, and if there is sufficient demand a junior squad will be organized, admitting boys from 9 to 12. A fee of \$5 will be charged each boy, it being expected that the balance of the expense will be provided by citizens interested in the development of the Scout movement.

# TRUCK FARM NEAR DESCHUTES PAYS

Three acres of garden truck on the ranch owned by Ernest Franks, near Deschutes, is worth at least \$3,000 Mr. Franks declares. He was in Bend Saturday with his first load of vegetables for the spring. Those who have the idea that corn will not thrive in Deschutes county would quickly lose this notion if they visited Mr. Frank's farm. In one half of corn, no less than 17 large, well formed ears were counted. His crop is the best in four years, Mr. Franks says.

## PETERMAN WRITES POETRY IN JAIL

### Twin Falls Man Held For Extradition, Is Former Newspaper Man.

"Stone walls do not a prison make, Nor iron bars a cage." More than one man has found consolation in the above truth. The ability to make the best of the worst situation is a mark of genius. John Bunyan is an historic example and O. Henry a modern one of what can come out of a prison. But when poetry of real merit finds its source in our own county jail, the lesson comes nearer home.

C. L. Peterman, held by the Deschutes county authorities on a warrant from Twin Falls, Idaho, is a former Seattle newspaper man and magazine writer, his wife told The Bulletin reporter. He was forced to quit indoor work and to change his occupation on account of poor health. Jails are dank and drear and dark, and wholly unattractive places, but Saturday, finding time heavy on his hands, Peterman called for writing material and dashed off the following little gem, which shows both literary taste and philosophic insight.

The flowers will as brightly bloom  
And just as lightly shed perfume  
When I have passed away;  
When I have passed away.  
The birds will just as sweetly sing  
Their glad orchestral offering  
To springtime's mad array.  
And as I sleep 'neath the warm sod
