SPARKS LAKE FOREST ROAD ENDED TODAY

explosive, employed in removing stumps and huge bowlders of basalt from the earth.

The Sparks lake road, beginning at Bend, reaches Lost lake—not to be confused with the similarly named body of water near Mt. Hood—at the end of a 25-mile climb, borders Sparks lake three miles farther on, and touches Devil's lake after another mile. From here a five-mile jaunt brings the tourist to Elk lake, famed as the Mecca

of all anglers who visit Central Oregon. From Elk lake, if the time is short, the motorist drives on, taking the left-hand forks of the road to connect with The Dalles-California highway at Harper, 20 miles south of Bend.

Joins Longer Loop.

For those who have opportunity for a longer trip, however, the road below Elk lake connects with a still larger loop. Crane Prairie, a vast plateau meadow, threaded by the Deschutes, is 14 miles from the lake, and two other bodies of water, Big and Little Lava lakes, are passed on the way. Both have been in good repute among anglers during the past season. This is the starting point of the second loop, which includes Twin lakes, Davis lake, with a side trip to Big and Little Cultus lakes, Odell lake and Crescent lake. From Odell, the tourist may go on to Diamond and Crater lakes, or he may start on his return trip, motoring through the town of Crescent, and then to La Pine. From here another newly completed forest road leads to East and Paulina lakes in the Newberry crater, 20 miles distant, and another road from the crater

rejoins The Dalles-California highway at Paulina Prairie, 25 miles south of Bend. The entire double loop trip approximates 160 miles and can be made in one day, but the vacationist would do well to schedule his journey in months instead.

Lofty Peaks Near Road.

Among noteworthy scenic features to be taken into consideration in the first part of the trip is Soda springs, a fountain of natural soda, a mile and a half from Lost lake, while mountaineers who make the tour will find the scaling of Bachelor, Tumalo, Broken Top and the South Sister of interest. The respective Heights of the four peaks are 9040, 8050, 9000 and 10,254 feet, and the great North glacier, on the last named mountain is one of the largest bodies of ice in the Cascades. Green lakes at the foot of the Slater, offers a chance for skating in mid-July and is considered the most beautiful group of glacial lakes on the eastern side of the Cascades. On the rocky cliffs bordering Devil's lake, an excellently preserved specimen of Indian picture writing is to be seen.
