

### Cobb Bags Bear But Camera Man Obtains No Film

Irvin S. Cobb, noted writer, who is "questing for quiet" among the Central Oregon mountains, and incidentally furnishing action for any quantity of film for subsequent movie production, bagged his first bear Thursday, according to a phone message received from the upper Vandevent ranch Friday afternoon by Dr. W. J. C. Vandevent of this city. The call came from Dr. Vandevent's father, who is chaperoning the party of bear slayers.

As far as movie fans are concerned, however, Mr. Cobb's exploit is an unwritten chapter, for the camera man was unable to keep in sight of either hunter or hunter. Two black bears were started by Mr. Vandevent's dogs, and Mr. Cobb chose the larger of the two. Eventually animal was tamed and the humorist, after losing dog and bear, dropped off to sleep, and was awakened by the baying of the hound nearby. A Whisnant was dispatched for the camera man. Mr. Cobb brought the bear to earth with six shots shortly after his departure.

That the party may remain out for some time was indicated by the fact that more dogs have been sent for, the hounds taken out at first having become worn out after holding to the rapid pace set by Mr. Cobb. Bear are unusually plentiful, Mr. Vandevent reports.

#### DISPOSE OF SLACKER FOWLS

Hens, Too Old or Too Lazy to Pay Their Way Should Be Eaten, Canned or Sold.

The slacker hens are too old or too lazy to pay their way, those using their food for mink fat and those that have finished their year's production of eggs and are beginning to molt. The poultryman cannot reasonably expect to maintain a high production if he has many birds of this stamp. Cull them out at once. They should be eaten, canned or sold.

#### DON'T CHANGE FEEDING PLAN

Various Methods May Be Successful as Conditions Are Different—Make Study of Flock.

If your method of feeding gives good results do not change it just because you read of other methods used by other poultry raisers. Various conditions may be successful; conditions are so different that they demand different methods. A poultry raiser must study the conditions of his own flock, their surroundings, the climate, etc.

#### Horsepower.

The nominal horsepower of an engine is determined by an approximate formula of which that of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce is the most common. According to this the horsepower is equal to the square of the diameter of the cylinder times the number of cylinders divided by two and one-half.

#### EXERCISE FOR LAYING HENS

Good Way is to Feed Oats, Wheat and Barley in Litter—Change the Straw Frequently.

One way to furnish exercise for laying hens is to feed oats, wheat and barley in litter. The floor is covered with straw 6 inches deep. In this the grain feed is scattered. The straw is changed frequently as it becomes soiled from droppings. Some of the poultry diseases are spread through droppings.
