CEMETERY MUST OBTAIN MONEY

The recently appointed cemetery association has carefully planned for the beautification of Pilot Butte cemetery, but until money is available, its plans cannot be crystallized into action. This, in brief, was the report of Mrs. A. F. Larson, member of the association, when she appeared before the city council Friday night. Assurance was given that in the coming city budget, provision would be made for the proper upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery, and an ordinance was introduced more clearly defining the duties and authority of the association.

The council heard and granted a petition for the installation of an arc light at the corner of Twelfth and Newport avenue and adjourned after passing a resolution directing that notices of the coming city election on November 2 be posted.

BIG CROWD HEARS THE TEMPLE CHOIR

The largest lyceum crowd in the history of Bend attended the opening number of the mill employes' series of five entertainments—the Temple choir—Friday night, filling the lower floor and overflowing into the balcony. A splendid concert given by the Shevlin-Hixon band, introduced the Ellison-White entertainers.

The members of the vested choir, five in number, won immediate favor with the crowd in the first part of the program, offering old-time religious songs, some with new arrangements, and closing with "Crossing the Bar" and the "Recessional." The voices of the choristers were of excellent quality and well balanced.

In the second part a greater variety was given, and if the ability of the entertainers had not been demonstrated before, it was clearly shown in the manner in which the sextet from "Lucia" was handled. Solos and clever readings were other features of the program.
