FOLEY CHAIRMAN OF CHAPTER ROLL CALL

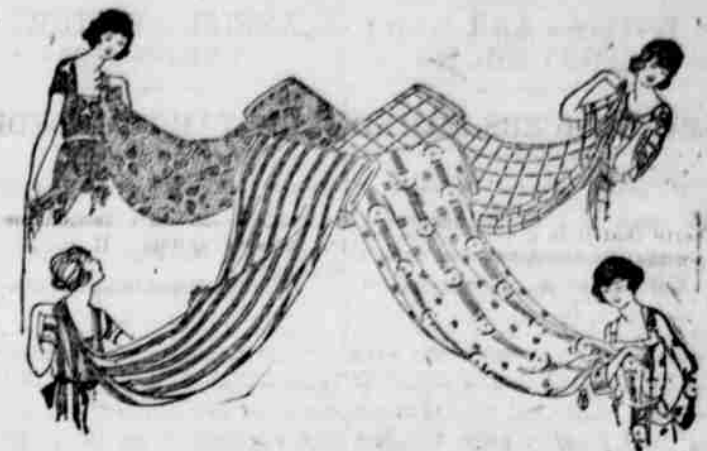

WARNER'S

Legislation proposed by initiative petition makes a longer list. It includes the single tax amendment, the constitutional amendment increasing the terms of sheriff, clerk, treasurer, coroner and surveyor to four years; the Port of Portland dock commission consolidation bill; the anti-compulsory vaccination amendment; the constitutional amendment to fix 4 per cent as the legal rate of interest; the Roosevelt bird refuge measure; the divided legislative session constitutional amendment, and the state market commission act.

In addition to state measures are county initiative measures having as their object the designation of Bend as the permanent county seat of Deschutes county and preventing livestock from running at large in part of Tumalo precinct and in the Grange and Alfalfa precincts.

Precinct candidates include E. D. Gilson for justice of the peace and Frank Kulp and L. A. W. Nixon for constable in Bend. C. A. Adams for constable in Redmond and H. A. Scoggins and J. A. Buchner for constable in Plainview and Butte No. 10, respectively.

At the same time that county, state and national elections are being held, municipal balloting will be taking place in Bend. T. A. McCann and E. D. Gilson are candidates for the office of mayor, Miss M. E. Coleman asks reelection as city treasurer and 12 candidates have presented themselves for election to the council, on which there are six vacancies. The petitions filed name H. E. Allen, D. G. McPherson, Lon L. Fox, G. H. Baker, J. A. Stevens, A. J. Goggans, Ralph Bartlett, Hugh O'Kane, C. J. Leverett, J. O. Gibann, J. S. Innes and N. H. Gilbert.
