FUNGI THAT DAMAGE CANVAS

Frequently Within the Space of Three Months the Material Will Be Made Useless.

Major W. Broughton-Alcock of the British army made some studies on the fungi that cause black and brown spots on canvas tents, awnings, etc., and that bring about a more or less rapid destruction of such articles. A note on the subject by J. H. Broughton appears in Nature. The investigations were carried out partly in Malta, where, it is said, awnings last only about a year. The principal destructive agents in the case of cotton and flax-made canvas were found to be Macrophorum and Stenphyllum. The variation in the color of the spots is found to be due to the presence of various other fungi in association with the genera above mentioned. The first signs of fungoid growth appear on the inner side of the roof portions of tents and marquees. Often within three months pressure on the spots made by the fungi leads to perforation, or a strong wind causes tearing. Experiments showed that the Willden (cuprammonium) method and cutch treatment prevented the growth of the fungi.—Scientific American.

Medical Triumph.

The successful operations on the brain of epilepsy patients performed by Dr. Walter E. Dandy of Johns Hopkins university, and by Dr. Curtis Burnham have now been verified by a number of other surgeons. When a definite set of muscles are affected in the epileptic spasms, seizures, attacks, fits, convulsions or loss of consciousness, as it may be called, the disease can often be traced to some fluid matter, scar or cyst which covers the section of the brain whose nerve fibers lead to the tongue or fingers. In other words, the first cure on record of an epileptic who lost consciousness during the attack was triumphantly brought to pass by Doctor Dandy.

Talked Like a Tailor.

Dried Flies for Fish.

A New York firm recently imported three tons of dried flies from South America. They were for feeding young fishes, and have found a ready sale to fish culturists.

The United States fisheries bureau bought 100 pounds of them, for an experiment, but results seemed to show that fine-chopped liver was better grub for baby trout. On a diet of liver they grew faster, and a larger percentage of them survived.

Highest Mountain in Idaho.

Hyndman peak is the only named mountain in Idaho that rises above 12,000 feet. It stands near the Blaine-Custer county line and has a height of 12,078 feet. There are, however, several unnamed peaks near Hyndman peak whose elevations are greater than 12,000 feet, as shown by the contours on the Halley topographic map, published by the United States geological survey.

TREE WAS ONCE A HANDSPIKE

Old Cottonwood at Norris City, Ill., Has Interesting History—Was "Planted by Boy in 1815."

At Norris City, Ill., there is a tree known as the "vaulting-pole cottonwood" that has an interesting history which is told by the American Forestry Magazine (Washington) as follows:

Hosier Pierce and a boy comrade returned from the war of 1812 to their homes, near Norris City, in the spring of 1815, and on January 8 of that year they had helped General Jackson whip the British in the Battle of New Orleans.

These boys both attended a log rolling on the old Pierce farm that spring, and as they were returning to the house after their day's work made a wager who could vault the furthest, using their cottonwood handspikes as vaulting poles. They both left their handspikes sticking in the soft earth where they had vaulted, and during the spring rains of 1815 they both took root and lived.

One of these trees died about ten years ago, but the other is still living and is 105 years old. This tree is about thirty feet in circumference, 175 feet high, with a very large hollow in the base of the tree which has been used as a housing for setting hens, a kennel for dogs and is always a fine playhouse for children.

CLOUDS ARE EARTH'S VEIL

If Seen From the Moon They Would Appear as Mere Film Separating the Earth.

The layer of cloud covering the earth is relatively very thin. If, for example, we could examine the earth from the moon we would doubtless see a veil of cloud covering little more than half the surface. At that distance the clouds would have no texture, the earth would appear swathed in an irregular sheet of formless vapor, through which, from time to time, the land and water areas could be seen.

The cloud cover of the earth is most attenuated; it may be compared to a film, for it is supposed to be less than one-eight-hundredth of the earth's diameter in vertical thickness.

The thinness of the earth's atmosphere may be more clearly comprehended if we realize that the relative thickness of the cloud layer on an eight-inch terrestrial globe would be about one-hundredth of an inch. Yet it is in this thin belt that clouds form, so that it is seen our weather is produced within limited confines.—The Ace.

Washing Rugs.

When either rugs or small carpets require washing dissolve four ounces of good white soap in four ounces of boiling water. When cool, add five ounces of glycerin and two ounces of chloroform. Bottle and cork well for use. When needed add one teaspoonful of the preparation to a pail of tepid water and wash the carpet with a flannel and soap in the usual way. One wash will have a wonderfully cleaning and brightening effect. Stretch out on a flat space, tightly nailing the corners or sides if necessary.
