COMPLAINT TO SEEK HEARING ON RAIL NEED

A complaint requesting that a hearing be set by the state public service commission to determine the ities. necessity for a railroad in Central Oregon from Bend to Crane to connect the lines already in operation, has been mailed to the commission headquarters in Salem by T. H. Foley, chairman of the Bend Commercial club special committee on railroad construction. The complaint sketches the vast resources of the section of the Central Oregon country which is without rail transportation and urges the advisability of trict 24 hours closer .to Portland through the construction of a connecting line between the Deschutes and Harney county railroad termini.

The statement of the Commercial club's grievances, as contained in the complaint, is as follows:

"At the present time there are two railroads operating to Bend, as their southern terminus, the same being the Oregon-Washington Railway and Navigation company, and the Oregon Trunk Railway company.

Would Open Big Area

"Construction upon a railroad leading in a westerly direction across the central part of the state of Oregon was sometime since commenced from Vale, in Eastern Oregon, and completed as far as Crane, a distance of approximately thirtyfive miles east from Burns, Oregon, and that construction work in connection therewith has stopped on such railroad at that point.

"There is between Crane and Bend the largest area of land without a railroad to be found within the Unitland, located between the above mentioned points, is suitable for stock raising, sheep raising and for raising of general agricultural pro-

"By reason of the lack of transportation facilities the above mentioned territory is devoted almost exclusively to stock raising and sheep raising, with the necessary port of such stock and sheep.

Timber Over-ripe

"At the present time a large amount of timber is being cut at. and in the vicinity of Bend, and manufactured into lumber. Practically all of this lumber is shipped to Eastern markets, All such lumber now goes north to the Columbia river, where it is a very little above sea level: It is carried thence over the various railroads across the bringing the eastern part of this disern markets. This means a great waste in energy in dropping from the elevation of Bend, approximately 3,600 feet, to the sea level, and then coming back to the same elevation in order to get across the mountain ranges between the point of shipment and the market.

"It also means an additional distance over that required for shipment to such markets over a railway which might be constructed be tween Bend and Crane. With such a railway constructed from Bend to connect with the present line at Crane, the timber products from the forests of Central Oregon would reach the Eastern market with a shorter haul, and also would avoid the heavy climb from near sea level on the Columbia river. The road from Bend to Crane would be constructed upon a practically level plateau, maintain the elevation at limited by the constitution, the sum Bend practically all the way across to the point of connection at Crane.

"A railway constructed from Crane to Bend will bring the Eastern Oregon country, adjacent to ed States at the present time.
