

DIRECTORS FOR CLUB SELECTED

TWELVE ARE CHOSEN AT ELECTION

Half Will Serve For Two Years, And Half For One Year—First Meeting of New Directorate Is Held At Inn This Noon.

Twelve directors for the new Bend Commercial club were chosen Friday night when ballots were counted at the Pilot Butte Inn. Twenty-four had been nominated in a previous primary election, and from the two dozen, the directorate was chosen. Half of those elected will serve for two years and the remainder for one, the places of the short-term incumbents to be filled with two-year men when their time of service expires.

STUDY IS MADE OF RESULT OF FIRES

Forest Service Seeks To Determine Percentage of Trees Dying In The Fox Butte Section.

To secure data as to the percentage of trees dying in later years as the result of forest fires, Assistant Supervisor W. H. Harriman of the Deschutes National forest is conducting observations in the Fox Butte country. Mr. Harriman reported this morning by long distance that the new phone line between Pine mountain and Cabin lake is completed. The new line goes by way of Fox butte and is 25 miles in length.

FINE FOR LACK OF DRIVER'S LICENSE

Ralph Dunn Pays \$5 In Justice Court, And Is Given 10 Days In Which To Secure a Permit.

Ralph Dunn, arrested Friday afternoon on a charge of violating traffic regulations, was haled into police court yesterday afternoon after the car he was driving had collided with one piloted by Forrest Lane. Municipal Judge Eastes decided that Lane had been going at an unsafe rate of speed at the crossing where the collision occurred, and no fine was levied against Dunn on this charge.

It developed, however, that Dunn had no driver's license and, acting in his capacity of justice of the peace, Judge Eastes fined him \$5 for this offense and allowed him 10 days in which to procure the necessary permit.

"BO-PEEP" SWARTZ PUZZLE TO WITNESS

Error of Stenographer In Preliminary Hearing, Rechristen's Joe Wilson's Confidant.

O. P. Swartz, one of five men to whom Joe Wilson, star witness for the state in the Weston murder case, told Weston's alleged admissions regarding the manner in which Krug came to his death, will be remembered at "Bo-Peep" after last Friday afternoon.

Glancing at a transcript of testimony taken in the preliminary hearing, Allan R. Joy, for the defense, asked the witness as to the whereabouts of "Bo-Peep." Wilson didn't know any little shepherds, but the attorney was insistent that the witness had mentioned the name in justice court. Attorneys for the state, noting the similarity of sound between the letters "O. P." and the words, "Bo-Peep," eventually explained the puzzle.

But Swartz remains "Bo-Peep" in at least part of the official record of the trial.

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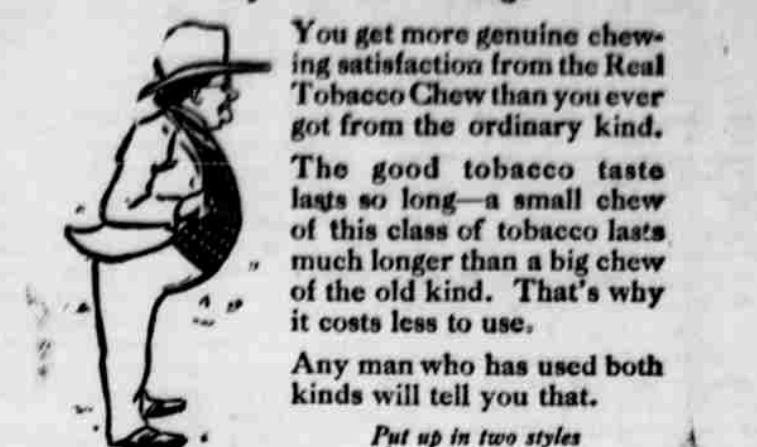
