

BEND BUDGET FINDS FAVOR

VOTE OF 234 TO 22 IS CAST AT SPECIAL ELECTION, ENDORSING \$70,299.50 ESTIMATE OF 1921 EXPENSES.

Although the vote cast at Saturday's special municipal election was a light one, the fact that the taxpayers of Bend are strongly behind the 1921 budget of \$70,299.50 was shown by the 211 majority polled in favor of this estimate of expenditures. Two hundred and thirty-three voted for the budget, while only 22 votes were cast against it.

The budget on which the levy to finance the city's expenses during the coming year was based was endorsed by the present city administration and by the council-elect as well.

CLUB ORGANIZATION NEARS COMPLETION

Administrative Committees Named, And Machine For Community Service Takes Tangible Form.

With the appointment of a number of administrative committees by the president and board of directors, the organization of the new Bend Commercial club is nearing completion. The machine which is being built for service to the community is fast taking tangible shape.

The finance committee consists of the treasurer, J. Edgar Purdy, L. M. Foss and E. P. Mahaffey.

A budget committee has been named to consist of the finance committee, with the addition of T. A. McCann and R. W. Sawyer.

The committee which is investigating the possibilities of a new secretary includes D. G. McPherson, C. S. Hudson, E. L. Vinal, H. A. Miller and J. P. Hennessey.

Another committee, to work on the Sisters-Tumalo road, has been appointed. It consists of J. B. Miner, Fred N. Wallace, Robert B. Gould, E. D. Gilson and J. S. Innes. The committee is expected to start an early campaign looking toward the completion of this road.

ASSISTANCE GIVEN TO EX-SERVICE MEN

All Oregon Soldiers, Sailors and Marines May Draw \$25 a Month To Aid in Their Education.

All ex-service men, who enlisted from Oregon, or who were residents of Oregon, but reported elsewhere for the convenience of the government, are informed of the state aid for educational purposes, given by Oregon to her ex-service men, in a statement issued by the home service section of the Red Cross.

Twenty-five dollars per month is given for attendance at an Oregon institution of learning. There is a revised application, in which an additional affidavit is required, in regard to whether or not civilian pay was received for civilian work.

A number of ex-service men are attending the Bend night school and are receiving state aid.

Application for state aid for educational purposes can be made through the home service section of the American Red Cross, Bend chapter.

CHRISTMAS SEALS WILL GO ON SALE

Hundreds of thousands of Christmas seals were sent out by the Oregon Tuberculosis association to practically every county in the state in readiness for the beginning of the sale, which was set for December 1. Quotas set for the counties of Central Oregon are: Deschutes, \$481.10; Crook, \$171.20; Jefferson, \$160.55.

WORK PROGRAM IS MADE READY

CONSTITUTES MOST IMPORTANT DOCUMENT OF MODERN COMMERCIAL CLUB, SAYS INSTALLATION DIRECTOR.

Attention is now being given to drawing up the program of work for the Bend Commercial club by P. E. Magruder, representative of the American City Bureau, in charge of the work.

"This is the most important document of the modern commercial club," said Mr. Magruder this morning. "It gives us a definite object to work for by telling us what the members want to see done."

The response has been fairly good, but I would like to see Bend establish a record in this respect by having a full return of the blanks. Now, let's all work together for the future welfare of Bend and Deschutes county."

MAIL BUSINESS GROWS LARGER

SUBSTANTIAL GAIN MADE OVER OCTOBER AND NOVEMBER OF LAST YEAR—PLANS MADE FOR CHRISTMAS RUSH.

While comparative figures are not yet available, the business transacted at the Bend postoffice in October and 26 days of November is larger than in the corresponding two months, complete, of 1919, Postmaster W. H. Hudson stated. Despite the fact that one permanent clerk has been added, the postoffice force is just as busy as it was a year ago, he says.

More help will be added as soon as the Christmas rush begins, the number of extra employees needed being left to the discretion of the postmaster. A feature of the holiday season work will be the use of an auto truck to deliver parcels on the city mail routes. In this way Mr. Hudson hopes to prevent the accumulation of Christmas packages in the office.

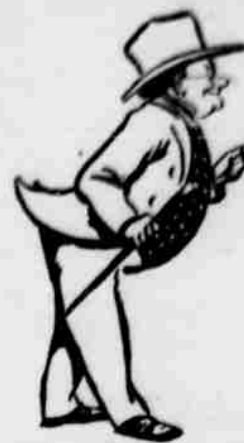
