Bend has 11 young men and women at the Oregon Agricultural college this year, who are taking an active part in the work and play of the big school. Commerce is the most popular course, seven out of 11 having chosen it.

Four are girls—Carol Boyd, Cora Dick, Mary Thompson and Jennie Norene. All stay at the various women's dormitories and all but Mary Thompson, home economics freshman, are registered in commerce.

Miss Norene recently took part in an essay contest held by the commercial club, in which she read a paper on the reclamation of logged-off lands around Bend.

Marion and Leroy Coyner, William Williams and Calvin Smith are all members or pledges of Omega Upsilon fraternity. Marion Coyner is out for wrestling this year, while his brother, a freshman in mechanical engineering, is working on the basketball squad.

William Williams is the only chemical engineering student from Bend.

Convinced that G. M. Russle and W. R. Lime, Slaked By Rain, Fires Wood, Tree, and House

Lime, slaked by the falling rain and snow, set fire to a woodpile, the flames were communicated from the tiers of stovewood to a juniper tree, and from there sprang to the roof of the J. E. Carley home on Division, south of Franklin, Friday afternoon. Mrs. Carley turned in an alarm, telephoning from the house of a neighbor, and the volunteer fire department responded in record time, stopping the fire before any real damage had been done. It was found necessary to use only the chemical engine in checking the flames.

MOOSE CHANGE DATE FOR CHRISTMAS TREE

In order not to interfere with the community Christmas tree program scheduled to be held at the gymnasium on the evening of December 24, the Bend Moose have decided to give their own Christmas eve exercises a day ahead of time. It will be held on the evening of Thursday, December 23, at the Moose hall, it was announced this morning.

The Moose program, which is to start at 8 o'clock, will be chiefly musical, with excellent vocal numbers and drills by children attired in the lodge colors. A Christmas tree and treats for the children of members of the lodge will be features of the evening.

SNOW LADEN GALE SWEEPS OVER BEND

On the first anniversary of the ending of Bend's record snow storm, the city experienced a combination rain and snow Friday night, driven by a gale from the southwest which is estimated to have attained a velocity of close to 30 miles an hour. The precipitation recorded during the late afternoon and evening was .31 of an inch in Bend, but that a much greater amount of moisture was stored in the higher country was indicated today in reports from Pine mountain, where snow fell to a depth of 10 inches, the equivalent of approximately an inch of rain.
