

VALUATIONS IN COUNTY PLACED FOR DISTRICTS

GAIN MADE BY BEND OVER LAST YEAR

UNION HIGH IS AHEAD

Distribution Is Completed By Assessor for School Units—Figures Include Apportioned Values of The Public Utilities.

Distribution of valuation in Deschutes county, including the apportioned values of public utilities recently furnished by the state tax commission has been completed by County Assessor W. T. Mullarky. The total is \$8,755,252, an against \$8,887,267 in 1919. A substantial increase over last year is seen in Bend, with \$1,749,258, against \$1,687,486 last year. The Redmond union high school district has \$2,438,172, compared with \$2,359,694 in 1919, and the city of Redmond shows a drop to \$315,330 from \$362,676.

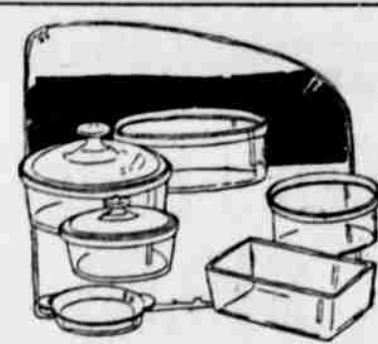

In the matter of the Gosney road: At this time comes on this matter for final hearing upon the report of the viewers herein, and it now appearing to the court that said report is favorable, and that such proposed road is a public necessity and should be allowed, it is ordered by the court that said report of the viewers herein be, and the same is hereby, adopted, and that the clerk issue his warrants for damages allowed as stated in said viewers' report, and further ordered that said road be, and the same is hereby, established in accordance with the resolution thereof adopted, and that a formal order establishing said road be prepared and recorded in the road records of this county.

The court was then adjourned to October 11th, 1920, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

The court reconvened pursuant to adjournment, all members being present.

ORDER DECLARING RESULTS OF ELECTION

In the county court of the state of Oregon, for the county of Deschutes. In the matter of the organization of the Sisters Irrigation District: Whereas, It manifestly appears to the satisfaction of the county court of Deschutes county, state of Oregon, that an election was duly and regularly held within the boundaries of the Sisters Irrigation district, as hereinafter set forth and described, on the 9th day of October, 1920, in accordance with the order of this court heretofore made, and with the notice thereof given by the county clerk of said Deschutes county, Oregon, which said notice was published for five consecutive weeks in The

Bend Bulletin, a newspaper published within Deschutes county, Oregon, and that the affidavit of E. D. Belden, principal clerk of the printer and publisher of the said newspaper, having been this day filed with the clerk of this court, with a copy of the said notice attached thereto and from which it appears that said notice was first published on the 3rd day of September, 1920, and thereafter each week, until the first day of October, 1920, and that said notice described the boundaries of said district as hereinafter set forth, and designated the name of said district as "The Sisters Irrigation District" and required the electors to cast ballots which contained the following question, to-wit: "Shall the Sisters Irrigation district be organized? Irrigation district—No." Yes and Irrigation district—No.

And it also appearing from the papers and receipts on file herein that, on the 3rd day of September, 1920, the county clerk sent a copy of said notice by registered mail to each land owner joining in the petition for the organization of the district, and it further appearing that Meredith Bailey, Jr., Millard T. Triplett and M. W. Knickerbocker were duly nominated by petition, signed by at least 10 of the electors in the proposed district qualified to vote for the officer or officers so nominated by them for directors of said proposed district as required by law, and that said election was in all respects regular and according to law, and the court having now, upon the 11th day of October, 1920, at the county courtroom of the said Deschutes county, Oregon, the said date being the first Monday succeeding such election, proceeded to canvass the votes cast at said election and, it appearing to the court from the re-

turns of the judges of said election, filed with the court, and of the canvass made by said court, that there was a total of 10 votes cast at said election and that of said total votes so cast, all, to-wit: 10 of said votes, were cast in favor of the formation and organization of said irrigation district and that no votes were cast against the organization of said irrigation district, and it therefore appearing that more than three-fifths of the total votes cast were cast in favor of the organization of said district, and it also appearing from said canvass of said votes and returns that the following named persons received the number of votes set opposite their several names for the office of director, viz:

Meredith Bailey, Jr. 10 votes
Millard T. Triplett 10 votes
M. W. Knickerbocker 10 votes
and that no other votes were cast for any office or for any other candidate at said election, and that Meredith Bailey, Jr., and Millard T. Triplett and M. W. Knickerbocker were the three persons receiving the greatest number of votes at said election and were elected as directors of said irrigation district.
