MANY STATES HAVE BONUS LEGISLATION

Various Means Taken In Recognizing Services of Men In Army, Navy and Marines.

Information on bonus legislation passed by various states for former service men, furnished by the home service section of the Red Cross, shows maximum awards from \$50 up. The following figures on the recognition accorded former soldiers, sailors and marines are given out by Mrs. V. A. Fornes, home service secretary here:

Massachusetts, \$1 per day for every day in the service; Maine, \$100 flat bonus; Minnesota, \$200 for college attendance only; New Hampshire, \$100 flat bonus; New Jersey, \$10 for each month of service, with a maximum of \$250; North Dakota,

\$25 a month for the express purpose of purchasing a home; Oklahoma, loan money to purchase farms; California, money voted to purchase land for soldiers; Oregon, \$25 a month, \$200 maximum, for educational purposes only; Rhode Island, \$100 flat bonus; Vermont, \$10 a month, \$120

maximum, for enlisted men only; Wisconsin, \$10 a month, \$50 maximum; Washington, \$15 a month for each month of service.
