### CITY'S GROWTH NOTED IN PLEA FOR NEW HIGH

#### DISTRICT NOTE ISSUE MARKETED

#### CONFIDENCE IS SHOWN

Discount of Only One Per Cent Is Taken By Buyers—School Superintendent Predicts Increase In Population And Prosperity.

Belief in the steady growth and increasing prosperity of Bend was evidenced last week in the report of City Superintendent S. W. Moore, recommending a new high school building to meet present and future needs of the district, and in the report of L. M. Foss, chairman of the finance committee, when he stated that the district's \$45,000 note issue, at a discount of only one per cent, has been marketed, and that only a few legal formalities remain to be completed.

Figures on attendance given by the superintendent showed the same steady growth in city population which he predicted for the future. Total enrollment for November was 1317, and for this month 1347, and the average daily attendance in November was 1135, with 1175 for December. He reported 95 per cent of attendance. High school enrollment was given as 42.

For September and October, the total enrollment was 1139 and 1287 for the respective months and the average daily attendance, given in the same order, was 920 and 1166.

#### Gum-Chewing Frowned on.

Discussion of the truancy problem occupied some time and members of the board, as well as the superintendent, expressed the opinion that the situation is being admirably handled by Tom Carlson as truant officer. The board was against the practice of smoking in the lobby of the Y. M. C. A. and against gum-chewing on the floor of the gymnasium when high school functions are in progress. It was decided that these matters be brought to the attention of the association management, with the suggestion that the canteen, where gum and cigarettes are on sale, be closed while school affairs are being held.

Relative to the school housing situation in Bend, Superintendent Moore recommended immediate and purposeful action in the matter of financing and building a new high school. Outlining present conditions and those expected to develop, he said, in his report:

"There is need for permanent buildings, as is shown by the construction, the use of 12 schoolrooms in shacks, the use of two rooms in a store building, and also two rooms in a cellar, making a total of 16 rooms that are temporary makeshifts at best, and wholly inadequate in meeting the needs of a modern school. Growth inevitable.

"These temporary buildings are a menace to the health of both pupils

and teachers, the store building in the matter of ventilation, the shacks in the matter of heating, and the cellar rooms in the matter of both heating and ventilating. Furthermore, the Bend school district shows an investment, in buildings per pupil accommodated, which is a figure so ridiculously low that it beggars comparison with cities of equal population elsewhere. Again, the schools, as they stand, are overcrowded, while a material and immediate growth seems certain. We have reached a point in our economic development where the less desirable of irrigable land must be taken up as a means of furnishing sustenance for an increasing population in need of homes, and the demand will increase in geometrical ratio in the future.

"This fact, coupled with the building of good roads and the development of the tourist business, assures permanency in Bend.

#### Advises Against Delay.

"Any argument that the mills will run part time, or on but one shift, is an argument for permanency and a continued building program, since this plan of operation will insure a payroll of sufficient volume to maintain a steady growth until sufficient acreage of desert or logged-off land is brought under cultivation, and other industries located to support the town, independent of the lumber industry. On the other hand, any artificial stimulus in the lumber industry which results in undue and excessive output, and corresponding exhaustion of timber, might be expected to disarrange the basis of permanent growth nature has provided for us.

"In the face of all the facts, I am convinced that dilatory methods, or failure to provide means for the erection of a school building, after the plan suggested, regardless of time or effort expended, can result in nothing less than a charge of lack of foresight on the part of the present superintendent and board."

### AUTO IS USED AS FILLING STATION

Standard Oil Manager Drives Part Way Home On Gas In Vacuum Feed—Seven Gallons Taken

A "Red Crown" trademark on the car of W. R. Speck, Standard Oil representative here, may have caused some needy autoist to believe that he was approaching a filling station. At any rate, that was the use to which Mr. Speck's gasoline tank was put recently. Seven gallons of motor fuel was taken while he was attending the Knights Templar meeting in the Masonic temple and, when within two blocks of his home, the machine stalled. The gasoline left in the vacuum feed had been insufficient.

Edgar Purdy paid a sincere tribute to the dead soldier in his sermon and left with the friends and relatives who gathered at the church a message of comfort and hope.

Many floral pieces were presented, among them one from Percy A. Stevens post, American Legion, representing, in poppies and violets, the Legion emblem. Six members of the post, H. Cato, Willard Houston, Ray Jackson, John Steidl, Jr., A. J. Casebeer and Leslie Davis, were present in uniform to act as pallbearers, and many other former soldiers, sailors and marines were in attendance. Interment was made in Pilot Butte cemetery.
