ALLIED DEMAND MEETS REFUSAL FROM GERMANY

EUROPE HEARS RUMOR OF NEW WARS

GUARD TO KEEP ARMS

Berlin Complicates Situation With Brusque Reply To Demand For Disarmament—Military Leaders Meet In Daily Conference.

PARIS, Dec. 29.—With rumors of new wars flitting about the European chancelleries, Germany complicated the situation today with a brusque reply to the allied demand for disarmament of the citizen's guard. The German reply linked the allied demand with the Brussels financial conference, declaring the conference would not be successful "under such exaggerated demands."

French officials declared there might be grave complications. Germany's refusal to demobilize the guard brought a serious situation to a climax, including the possibility of allied occupation of the Ruhr industrial district, and perhaps other parts of Germany.

It is declared in official circles that the allies are determined to carry the issue to a conclusion with Germany, which so far has evinced no signs of yielding. Allied military leaders are understood to be in daily conference here.

MANY AUTOS OWNED IN NORTH DAKOTA

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 29.—North Dakota has one automobile to every nine persons in the state. The number of machines registered this year was 81,545, according to the report of the state motor vehicles registration department. In 1916 the number was 40,446; in 1917, 62,993; in 1918, 71,687, and in 1919, 82,855.

Hundred Species of Petrels.

Scattered over widespread areas of the ocean are more than 100 species of petrels, but among the most interesting are the fulmars. Sailors of British vessels commonly refer to them as "mollymawks," a corruption of malmuk, the birds in great flocks follow in the wake of ships, and are especially fond of whaling vessels, for they like the substance that is thrown out in the refuse from whale cleaning. The fulmar ranges over the North Atlantic from 45 degrees latitude on the American side, and lower, to 53 degrees as the farthest south, on the European side.
