

WOMEN'S PROTECTIVE DIVISION ACCOMPLISHES MUCH IN WORK FOR WELFARE OF BEND GIRLS

Recently, when Mrs. Emerson Stockwell, head of the local Women's Protective bureau, issued a call to the people of Bend for clothing, to be sent to the White Shield home in Portland, attention was called to the wonderful debt of gratitude community, city and state should feel toward the Salvation Army, under the management of which this home is being conducted.

Since the creation of the Women's Protective division in Bend last April, 56 Deschutes county girls, because of either educational handicap, undesirable home surroundings, or for other reasons, have been sent to this home, where they were received as members of one big family and placed within a pleasant environment, under the best of moral influences.

Many of these girls have remained within the home but a few days before taking up some line of vocational training in the trade, commercial, or other special schools of Portland. They are now happy and contented in their new surroundings and are rapidly fitting themselves to be useful members of society.

While in training, the expenses of most of these girls are met by relatives. There are among the number, however, those who have neither relatives or friends financially able to assist them and to these the local bureau lends expense money.

Several of the girls from this county are helping themselves by either working in private homes and for the Y. W. C. A. for their board, at the same time keeping up their regular courses in the lines of training they have chosen.

All of these girls, and hundreds of others from other parts of the state, remain under direct supervision of the Salvation Army officers in charge of the home until they no longer require such guidance.

Through Major Harris, superintendent of the home, Mrs. Stockwell

keeps in touch with each girl sent from Deschutes county, looking after the personal needs of each.

Realizing the great benefit of this line of social service, the Bend Study club, the aid societies of the various churches, the domestic art class of the high school, other organizations and many individuals responded to Mrs. Stockwell's suggestion. The following letter bears testimony of the spirit of appreciation in which the donation was received.

"Dear Mrs. Stockwell: We have received the two boxes of beautiful clothing you so kindly sent at Christmas time and I wish to thank the friends who donated these garments, for we can use every one of them, and I assure you we appreciate your thoughtfulness and kindness in wishing to assist us in helping these unfortunate girls and their babies. We have at the present time 50 girls and 31 babies, and you may know our expenses are very heavy.

TWO ORDERS JOIN IN DIRECTING SERVICES

Many Friends of Mrs. Jennie A. Holmes, and Classmates of Her Daughter, Attend Funeral.

Mrs. Jennie A. Holmes, who died early in the week at her new home at 1193 Wall street was buried Thursday in Pilot Butte cemetery, following services held at the Methodist church under the auspices of the Mooseheart Legion and the Pythian Sisters. The funeral was attended by a large number of friends of the family, and by the members of the 7A class of the junior high school, of which Mrs. Holmes' daughter is a member. Many beautiful floral offerings and wreaths were massed about the casket.

Mrs. Holmes was born at Negaunee, Mich., January 28, 1879. On August 16, 1899, she was married. She was a member of the Modern Samaritans, in Duluth, and in Bend belonged to Mooseheart Legion, the Pythian Sisters and the home department of the Methodist church. Her husband, C. A. Holmes, and a daughter, Alice, aged 13, survive her in Bend, and a son, Leslie, aged 19, is in the U. S. Navy.

LONG SEARCH MADE FOR MISSING BOYS

At the end of an all-day search, in the course of which a distance of more than 60 miles was covered, Deputy Sheriffs George Stokoe and J. M. Griffin overtook Basil Bailey, son of R. H. Bailey, and Tom Collier, son of F. H. Collier, last Wednesday afternoon. The runaway boys, both residents of Tumalo, are about 16 years of age. Bailey was eight miles from home when found and Collier, who had decided that the life of a runaway was not as pleasant as he had anticipated, was on his way back to his father's ranch when overtaken.

When the boys left home, Bailey carrying a six-shooter and Collier taking a rifle. They camped out at night with only three quilts. Apples and beef, procured at a farmhouse, formed their daily diet.

P. O. RECEIPTS MAKE BIG GAIN

REPORT FOR QUARTER COMPLETED

\$7066.29 Taken in for Last Three Months of 1920, \$1489.21 in Excess of Total for Corresponding Period in 1919.

Gross postoffice receipts for the quarter ending December 31, 1920, were \$7066.29, a report just completed by Postmaster W. H. Hudson shows, as against \$5636.08 for the corresponding period in 1919. The increase is considerably larger than that made in the last quarter of 1919 over 1918, the gross receipts for the last quarter two years ago being \$5084.85. The gain made this year is all the more striking in view of the fact that, due to the introduction of the carrier system, receipts from box rents are considerably less than in 1919.

Parcels received for delivery at the local office in the last quarter of the past year numbered 2022, as against 1777 in the three months ending the year before. Parcels received for transmission through the mails totaled 851 in the final quarter of 1920. In the corresponding period of 1919, the number was 562.

TRANSCRIPT BEGUN IN WESTON APPEAL

As the next step in appealing the case of A. J. Weston, now serving a life term in the penitentiary for the murder of Robert H. Krug of Sisters, a transcript is being prepared in Portland, E. O. Stadter, attorney for Weston, states.

The defense, shortly after Weston's sentence was passed, filed a motion in circuit court, asking that the county defray the cost of the transcript, on the grounds that Weston had no means of financing this step in the proceedings. No definite ruling has been made by the court.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Ore., Dec. 10, 1920.
The county court reconvened, pursuant to adjournment, all members being present.

In the matter of The Dalles-California highway:
Ordered, That this county will cooperate with the state highway commission in the maintenance of the Bend-Allen Ranch section of The Dalles-California highway, from June 1, 1920, in the amount of \$150, on a 50-50 basis.

In the matter of the bee inspector:
Upon the petition of C. P. Becker and others for the appointment of a bee inspector for this county, it is ordered that A. J. Sanford be, and he hereby is, appointed bee inspector for this county, and his salary is hereby fixed at \$1 per year.

In the matter of probation officer:
Ordered, That Mrs. E. F. Stockwell be, and she hereby is, appointed the probation officer of the juvenile department of the county court.

In the matter of the graveling of roads:
Ordered, That the county clerk issue his warrant for \$949.49 to W. H. May for graveling roads, and that he issue his warrant for \$3057.60 to Wickner, Sharp & Chindahl for graveling the Tumalo road, and that said warrants be issued upon the general road fund.

The court was then adjourned to December 21, 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

Bend, Ore., Dec. 21, 1921.
County court reconvened at 10 in the forenoon, pursuant to its adjournment, all members being present.

In the matter of a gravel pit:
Ordered, That the county purchase blocks 19, 20, 21, 22, 27, 28, 29 and 30 of the Northwest Townsite company's first addition to Redmond, for a consideration of \$2500, for a gravel pit, abstract to be furnished for approval by the district attorney and a warrant to be issued in payment therefor on his approval of title and deed.

In the matter of claims:
Ordered, That claims No. 133 to No. 141, inclusive, as the same are entered in the claim docket of this court at page 243, be, and the same are hereby, allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

In the matter of labor pay rolls:
Ordered, That the payroll for men employed on force account in the construction of county roads, as said payrolls are entered at page 31 of the record of road payrolls of this court, be, and the same are hereby, allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

The court was then adjourned to meet December 29, 1920, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

Bend, Ore., Dec. 29, 1921.
The county court reconvened December 29, 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, pursuant to adjournment, all members being present.

In the matter of the state teachers' convention:
Ordered, That the county clerk be, and he hereby is, instructed to issue his warrant on the general fund for \$60, payable to J. Alton Thompson, for his expenses in attending the state teachers' convention.

In the matter of the assessment of E. D. Coyner:
Now is presented the affidavit of wrongful assessment of E. D. Coyner, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the court that the statement is true, it is ordered that the same be, and hereby is, approved, and that the sheriff have credit on the 1919 tax roll for \$5.99, the amount of such wrongful assessment.

In the matter of road payrolls:
Ordered, That the clerk issue his warrants in payment of laborers employed on force account in the construction of public roads, as the pay rolls are made up and entered in volume 1, pages 32, 33 and 34 of the payroll record.

The court was then adjourned to meet December 30, 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

Bend, Ore., Dec. 30, 1921.
The county court for Deschutes county reconvened, pursuant to its adjournment, all members being present.

In the matter of the Bend-Sisters highway:
This matter comes on to be heard upon the application of the state highway board for resolution for the establishing of a certain highway between Bend and Sisters, in this county, and it appearing to the court that such matter should be taken up by resolution, it is therefore ordered that a resolution be prepared declaring the intention of this court to establish a highway between Bend and Sisters, according to the survey thereof made by the state highway engineer.

The court was then adjourned to meet December 31, 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

Bend, Ore., Dec. 31, 1920.
The county court reconvened, pursuant to adjournment, all members being present.

In the matter of road payrolls:
Ordered, That the payrolls for laborers employed on force account in the construction of county roads, as the same are entered at page 35 of the payroll record, be, and the same are hereby, allowed and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

Ordered that claims Nos. 142 to 198, inclusive, as the same are entered at pages 241 and 245 of the claim docket of this court, be, and

the same are hereby, allowed, and the clerk is instructed to issue his warrants in payment thereof.

In the matter of right of way:
Ordered, That the county clerk issue his warrant on the road fund in the sum of \$150, payable to Richard Tully for the right of way over his lands for the Redmond-Sisters highway, and further, that the county court pay the costs of fencing the land taken.

In the matter of borrow pit:
Ordered, That the county clerk issue his warrant on the road fund in the sum of \$125, payable to Otto Olson, for borrow pit.

Ordered, That the county will cooperate with the residents in the amount of \$150 for road work on the Helmholz hill, the residents of that section to do an equal amount of work.

In the matter of the district attorney's expenses:
Ordered, That A. J. Moore, district attorney, be allowed his expenses incurred in attending the annual meeting of the district attorneys to be held in Portland on January 13 and 14.

In the matter of the Fryrear road:
Ordered, That Robert B. Gould, John A. Runge and Frank H. May be, and they are hereby, appointed viewers, to meet at the point of beginning on said road on January 17, 1921.

The court was then adjourned sine die.

20 GIRLS RELEASED FROM SUPERVISION

Following the discontinuation of the women's protective division, 20 girls under parole to Mrs. E. F. Stockwell, formerly head of the division, have ceased to report, and are now under no supervision, it was learned Monday.
