CLUB AGAINST MEDFORD PLAN

DIRECTORS UNWILLING TO ASSIST IN MOVE TO INCLUDE DIAMOND LAKE IN CRATER LAKE PARK.

Directors of the Bend Commercial club, in session Thursday afternoon, refused the request of the secretary of the Medford Commercial club for assistance in obtaining the extension of Crater Lake National park to include Diamond lake.

The refusal was made on the grounds that such an extension would curtail hunting and camping privileges and would cut off valuable grazing land, while any benefit from such a move would be directly for Medford to the exclusion of Bend.

CARCASS OF BUCK FOUND BY WARDEN

The carcass of a 4-year-old buck of the mule deer species, found two and a half miles from Brooks-Scanlon camp No. 2 Thursday by District Game Warden Earl B. Houston has been placed in cold storage here pending instructions from the state game commission.

Warden Houston found the buck late yesterday morning. The carcass had been cleaned and was still warm, but the open nature of the country had made it impossible to surprise the man who had killed the venison. He had disappeared a few minutes before the arrival of the game warden.

WILL FILE PLAT OF LOGGED OFF ACREAGE

Filing of the platted acreage of Brooks-Scanlon logged-off land lying north of the Arnold ditch and east of the state highway will be made at the next term of county court. It has been learned. The land is subdivided into 40-acre tracts and will be irrigated from the Arnold ditch.

Approximately 1200 acres are included in the tract, much of which has already been disposed of by the company to employees and others.
