

## ANGLERS URGE VITAL CHANGES

### RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY SPORTSMEN

Earlier Opening, Reduction in Seven Day Bag Limit, Rotation of Lakes, and Protection of Spawns, Aims —D. H. Peoples New President

Recommendations, which if carried out will vitally affect the future of Central Oregon as an angler's paradise, are contained in resolutions passed Friday night by the Bend Rod and Gun Club. The resolutions are to be taken up with state authorities through M. A. Lynch, of Redmond, member of the game commission.

The gun club, in its recommendations, seeks to have the season for fishing in the Deschutes and Metolus rivers start on April 1, instead of remaining closed for the first half of the month as is now provided. Investigation of the feasibility of closing certain lakes to make possible a system of rotation, is also asked. The daily bag limit of 20 pounds is not contested, but the resolutions would set 50 pounds as the maximum for any seven consecutive days.

**Would Protect Spawns.**  
An investigation aimed at the trout's greatest enemy, the whitefish, is asked. This investigation seeks would have in mind the headwaters of the Deschutes, including Big and Little Lava lakes. One of the favorite items in the diet of the whitefish, it is pointed out by sportsmen, is trout spawn.

Election of officers was held. D. H. Peoples being chosen president to succeed N. G. Jacobson, while R. N. Buchwalter was named vice-president, R. S. Hamilton secretary, and Dr. W. G. Manning treasurer.

On the B. H. S. team every man scored, but the main star of the game was Brosterhous, who personally made forty-two points. Orrell, Johnson and Coyner were nearly equally tied for second place. Loehr playing guard did not have many chances to score. It is due perhaps to the guarding of Loehr that the score of the opposing side was held down to so low a figure.

On the town team, Byberg made most of the points with both forwards sharing second honor.

The crowd at the game was smaller than usual but was a fair representation of the basketball fans of the city.

## SCHOOL BOARD TO BUY BONDS

SECURITIES WILL BE CHOSEN TO ALLOW USE OF MONEY TO RETIRE BOND ISSUE ON CENTRAL BUILDING IN 1926.

The school district No. 1 sinking fund, amounting at present to \$4300, is to be invested in the highest interest bearing securities which will allow the district the use of the money in 1926. This was decided by the Bend school directors at their regular meeting last week. In the year specified the \$6500 issue floated to finance the construction of the Central school building, torn down last fall, will mature.

The report of the school nurse, submitted last night, showed that on February 14 there were 62 cases of measles in the schools, and that on March 1 the number had been reduced to 49.

## CLEANUP TIME NOW AT HAND

**FIRE CHIEF AND CITY PHYSICIAN URGE ELIMINATION OF HEALTH AND FIRE HAZARDS IN EARLY SPRING.**

Spring time is cleanup time, and in the brief lull which is preceding the resumption of industrial activity, Bend has the best chance in the world to "doll up" for summer, Fire Chief Tom Carlon points out.

Much work of the kind is being voluntarily done by property owners, and more will be undertaken under the direction of the fire chief and the city physician.

## COPPER TUBING IS HELD BY OFFICIALS

Metal Found in Suitcase of Fred W. Zimmerman To Be Returned To Him When He Leaves City.

While Fred W. Zimmerman, rancher south of Deschutes completes arrangements for the sale of his farm property, a coil of new copper tubing and a small sheet of copper will remain in the office of Mayor E. D. Gilson. As soon as Zimmerman finishes his business in this section and starts on the return trip to Anacortes, Washington, he may have his hardware, the mayor says. The copper was taken from Zimmerman's suitcase Friday night when Officers Carlon and Fox, and the mayor entered the owner's room in the Lawrence building on Wall street. The suitcase smelled strongly of moonshine, the officers stated. The tubing and sheet metal had been purchased to be used on a launch which Zimmerman intends to run from Anacortes, he told the officers.

## HATCHING IS SLOW AT TUMALO PLANT

Appearance of Fry Retarded By Low Temperature of Water—Rainbow Eggs To Be Sought By Official.

Eastern brook trout eggs at the Tumalo hatchery have progressed little beyond the "eyeing" stage, although a million or so of spawn taken at Elk lake at the same time have already been hatched at the McKenzie plant. Warmer water at the hatchery on the west side of the mountains is the reason assigned by Pearl Lynes, superintendent at the Tumalo plant.

Mr. Lynes will seek permission later in the season to secure rainbow trout eggs from Diamond lake, he states.

## SIZE OF INCUBATOR SHOULD BE GOVERNED BY INDIVIDUAL NEEDS

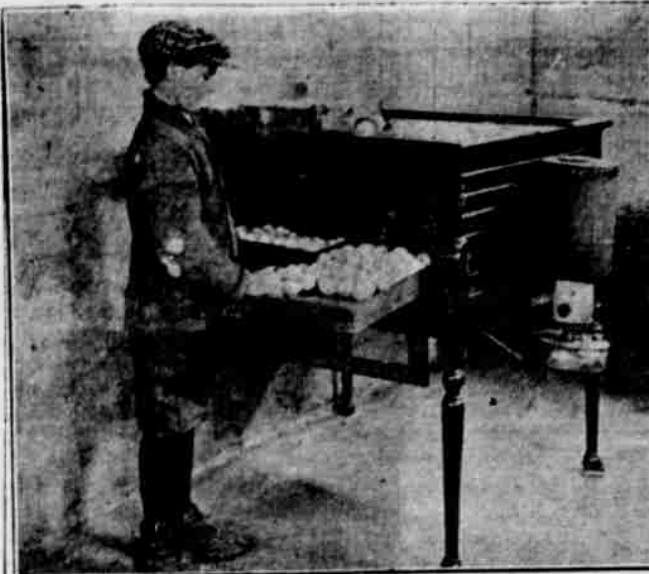
IS NO ONE BEST SIZE, SAYS U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE —PURCHASE KIND USED WITH BEST SUCCESS BY NEIGHBORS, IS ADVICE GIVEN.

After the poultryman has made up his mind to buy an incubator, he is confronted with the question of makes and sizes. As a general rule, a cheap machine is a poor investment, requiring more attention than a good one and wearing out quicker, besides being less dependable. The value of the machine is small compared with that of the eggs used during the normal life of an incubator. It is poor economy, therefore, to buy a machine which is not reliable. Whenever possible it is well to select the kind of incubator that has given satisfaction in your neighborhood, so that you may get the benefit of the experience of other operators near by.

**Varies With Needs.**  
The best size of incubator to buy varies with numerous circumstances, say poultry specialists of the United States department of agriculture.

Incubators are operated in a great variety of places with success. Where only a few small machines are used they are usually located in a room or the cellar of the house. A special cellar or incubator house should be provided if the incubator equipment is extensive, or if mammoth machines are used. It is important to have a well ventilated room not subject to wide variations in temperature. If built above ground, the walls should be double and the entire building well insulated.

Good results in hatching are secured in incubator cellars and in incubator rooms entirely above ground level, but the cellar is more commonly used. Incubators may be operated in buildings with single walls, especially per hen, provided that about one-half of the flock is to be renewed yearly and no outside hatching is carried on. The larger machines cost less in proportion to their capacity than the smaller ones.

one of at least 150-egg capacity. Special conditions, though, often exist which make smaller machines valuable.

A small machine is often used in connection with a larger one, all eggs being placed in the large machine after the first or second test. Many poultrymen believe that it pays to have an incubator large enough to hatch the bulk of their stock in two or three batches, so that much time is saved in tending to the incubators and brooders. In addition the chickens are more uniform in size than those hatched when the incubating period extends over a longer time. A fair estimate for a poultry farm is an incubator of one egg capacity in regions which have a mild climate, but a well-insulated room is preferable.

The incubator room or cellar should be large enough to allow the attendant to work around the machines conveniently. Many incubator cellars are provided with some system of ventilation in addition to the windows. This is not always necessary, however. The chief point is to keep the air in the room fresh. Muslin screens on the windows provide good ventilation without draft and at the same time keep the sun from shining on the machines. Many incubator cellars have cement floors, which are easier than dirt floors to keep clean and neat.

## HOME DEMONSTRATOR TO WORK IN COUNTY

Arrangements are being made whereby Deschutes county will obtain the services of a home demonstration agent without cost to the county. This is made possible through the cooperation of the O. A. C. extension service, Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, Oregon home demonstration leader, and the Deschutes County Farm bureau.

The success of the dress form project in the county last year is largely responsible for the favor shown this county by Mrs. McComb.

The ultimate aim of the home demonstration agent is the development of better farm homes.
