

Incubators are operated in a great variety of places with success. Where only a few small machines are used they are usually located in a room or the cellar of the house. A special cellar or incubator house should be provided if the incubator equipment is extensive, or if mammoth machines are used. It is important to have a well ventilated room not subject to wide variations in temperature. If built above ground, the walls should be double and the en-
