ALFALFA, SILAGE INCREASE WEIGHT

Experiments Conducted Under Direction of Agricultural College Show Food Values.

CORVALLIS, March 24.—Beef cattle at the Eastern Oregon Experiment station at Union, averaging 945 pounds at the beginning of the test, have gained 81 pounds per head in 60 days on a ration of alfalfa hay and corn silage. A similar lot of cattle of the same weight receiving a ration of alfalfa hay and peas and barley silage have gained 67 pounds. A third lot on alfalfa hay and sunflower silage made a gain of 43 pounds.

In a growing test with calves the lot that received alfalfa hay and corn silage made a gain of 62 pounds per head in 60 days. Those on alfalfa hay and peas and barley silage gained 56 pounds. The calves on alfalfa hay and sunflower silage made a gain of 46 pounds, and those on alfalfa hay without silage gained 39 pounds.

These cattle will all be on feed for another 60 days and the final results may be somewhat different from those of the first 60 days.
