Burning Coal Dust.

The enterprises of one motorcar manufacturer extend even to the ownership of mines in West Virginia, from which he digs coal for his motorcar factory.

In the plant at River Rouge, Mich., eight enormous boilers are being installed for furnaces which will burn pulverized coal and gas simultaneously. This will be accomplished by firing the coal vertically from the top and injecting the gas horizontally through the side of the furnace, the coal flame and gas flame uniting at the proper point for greatest efficiency.

These furnaces will burn 1,000 tons of coal per day, and from the time the coal leaves the mines in West Virginia until its residue is carried away as ashes, it will not be touched by human hands. All requisite operations will be done mechanically—dumping, pulverizing, carrying to bins, stoking, and even transportation of the ashes in small dummy cars.

FARM REMINDERS

Manure should be applied to the soil now rather than allowed to lie over until next year. In making an application on a corn field, the well rotted manure should be applied and then disked in well. Commercial fertilizers should be applied and then harrowed before plowing in order that they may be more evenly distributed. Poor results from commercial fertilizers are often due to too late and uneven distribution of the fertilizer.

Commercial fertilizer applied to potatoes is better in general if distributed so no considerable amount touches the seed. A heavy application, if applied in the row may in some instances kill the seed potato. Dropping nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia on the planted seed is practically sure to kill the potato.

Cultivation should be started now that the dry season is at hand. The most effective mulch is one two and one-half to three inches in depth and made up of crumbs from the size of peas to the size of hickory nuts.

Sulphur on alfalfa gives better returns when harrowed in, as the harrowing works the sulphur down to the plants can get it, and also distributes it more evenly.

As soon as Canada thistle or other perennial weed patches appear they should be marked off so that plowing and other operations may take place without scattering the roots to other parts of the field. The only successful method of controlling these pests is that of thorough, clean culture, which prevents them from getting leaves above ground. The very small patches may often be dug out advantageously, rather than take the risk of their spreading. In this case all roots should be destroyed.

SHEEP DIP WILL BE TREE DEFENSE

New Use Found For Odorous Preparation—Expected To Stop The Destruction By Beavers.

Sheep dip will have a new use in Bend shortly, if D. T. Carmody succeeds in doing what he intends with it. Beavers along the river are destroying fruit trees in Mr. Carmody's yard. State game laws afford protection to the beaver, but Mr. Carmody plans protection for his trees.

His first line of defense will be a woven wire entanglement, or fence. If the beavers succeed in penetrating that, gas will be used in stopping the rodents—at least, Mr. Carmody hopes that the odor of sheep dip, with which he will paint the bark of the trees, will persuade the animals to seek food and recreation elsewhere.
