MINISTER REPORTS ON STEEL INQUIRY

Investigation of Inter-Church Committee Reveals Grievances Which Are Now Being Corrected.

An interesting report on the investigation of the steel strike, conducted by a committee from the Inter-church World movement, was given Sunday night at the Methodist church by Dr. Gabriel Sykes, of Hood River. His report was based on that of Bishop McConnell of Pittsburgh, who was chairman of the committee.

In spite of the attacks of the Wall Street Journal and others, who declared that the ministers were not fitted to conduct such an inquiry, none of their findings have been openly disputed, it was stated. Three grievances were reported on the part of the workers—the 12-hour day, the seven-day week, and the spy system. All of these are on the way toward correction as a result of the publicity given the investigation, said Mr. Sykes.

This was the first of a series of talks which Dr. Sykes will give in connection with the summer school which the Methodist church is holding for the next 10 days. Questions are welcomed at all times, Rev. J. Edgar Purdy announced last night.

Prospects for artesian water for irrigation in the Fort Rock valley are encouraging, says L. Antles, who returned Saturday afternoon after accompanying Ira D. Williams, geologist for the state bureau of mines, to that locality, to continue his examination to determine the best place to locate a test well.

Two wells in that vicinity, less than 100 feet deep, bring water to within 10 feet of the top of the ground, Williams declared. If artesian water is obtained, only cheap fuel would make pumping practicable for irrigation.

Eighteen houses in the Silver Lake valley are surrounded by water, Mr. Antles reports. It had been dry for four years, but previous to that had only dried up for single years, and may again hold water the year around.

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
