PIONEER WOMAN HAD AN EVENTFUL LIFE

POWELL BUTTE, June 29.—Catherine Spray died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mary V. Charlton, June 21, 1921, aged 87 years and six days. "Grandma," as she was lovingly called by everybody, had been in feeble health since Easter Sunday, but had been comparatively free from any suffering until just two days before she passed away. She was born in Fulton county, Illinois, in 1834, crossed the plains with her father, John Rigdon, and family in 1852, six months being taken to make the trip with ox teams. They settled in Marion county, near where Woodburn now stands. She was married the following year to Frank Guerin. She was the mother of five children, three of whom are living. They are: A. L. Guerin of Salem, E. L. Guerin of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, and Mrs. Mary B. Charlton of Powell Butte. She had been a member of the Christian church for more than 50 years. The funeral was held Thursday from the community hall, Powell Butte. Special music was furnished by Mrs. Charles Elkins and Mrs. Glen Hendrickson of Prineville and she was laid to rest in the quiet little cemetery at Powell Butte. "Grandma" was of a peculiarly winning nature and was loved by all. As one was heard to remark, "Grandma belonged to us all. We have all lost a mother when God took her home." The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. Gallagher of Prineville, who spoke from the particularly fitting text, "I have fought the good fight; I have finished my course; I have kept the faith," etc.

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SHOOT WANTED BY PORTLAND
TOURNAMENT OF TRAPSHOOTERS WON FOR BEND AGAINST STRONG OPPOSITION—GOOD SCORES MADE.

"We got what we went after," said R. N. Buchwalter, member of the Bend trapshooting team, which returned from attending the state shoot at Astoria. "In getting the tournament for Bend next year, we ran up against strong opposition from Portland, but the final vote was 4 to 1 for Bend."

The date for the shoot was not set, but it will be about the middle of next June.

"This tournament will bring to Bend a fine bunch of sportsmen, many of whom will be making their first trip. We will have an opportunity to show them the advantages of this country for hunting and fishing," Buchwalter said.

Inexperience in tournament shooting was given by the members of the team as the reason for their scores being below those made at the home traps. They were also handicapped by the fact that rain fell constantly after their arrival until Tuesday afternoon.

As it was, good scores were made by the Bend men. On Sunday, S. T. Fox scored 87 and Buchwalter 86. Fox made 89 on Monday, this being the highest score made by a Bend entry. H. D. Innis scored 84. On Tuesday V. A. Smith made 84 and Buchwalter 82.

MUST HAVE PERMIT TO BURN SLASHINGS
From now on, no slashings may be burned without a permit from a state or United States forest official, announces Jack Bowman, district fire warden, following his return from a trip to the Crescent country on fire prevention work. COUNTRY OF SWEET SCENTS
French City of Lyons Center of Region Which Supplies the World With Perfumes.

Lyons, in France, is the city of scents. It is the center of a region which supplies the world with perfumes, and has the only university that offers a course in perfumery-making to students. Within the last few years Lyons has developed a great laboratory system for the manufacture of artificial perfumes by the process of synthetic chemistry. Thus its technical experts convert oil of verbena into violet and lily-of-the-valley, oil of camphor into heliotrope, aniseed oil into hawthorne, oil of clove into vanilla, and oil of rosewood into bergamot. Toluene (a derivative of coal tar) they transform into jasmine and artificial rose. From xylene (likewise a coal tar product) they obtain artificial musk.

Roses are grown on an immense scale in the region about Lyons for the manufacture of perfumery. Likewise sage, thyme and sweet marjoram. That region produces 90 per cent of the total world's output of real lavender oil, representing a value of 20,000,000 francs a year. One concern has 10 square miles planted with lavender.

ALMOST GAVE AWAY SECRET
Little Girl Would Have Had Sweet Revenge If She Had Reached That Troupe.

A prominent Vigo county business man wears a toupee. Only his family and closest friends know. But recently it almost became a public fact. He was dining with his wife and some friends at a large hotel, when in walked another friend with his four-year-old daughter. The business man likes to tease children, so he immediately began on this one. He called her a little boy, and persisted in addressing her in that way. It was evident she was not enjoying the incident, and the Vigo county man's wife came to the child's rescue. "If he doesn't stop calling you names I'll pull his hair if I were you," she advised.

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The little girl started to follow that advice, and then fun did begin. The way that man ducked and begged the youngster to desist threw the crowd into paroxysms of laughter. But the people who knew about the toupee nearly went wild. BUCKET BRIGADE IS IN ACTION AT PLANT
Serious Delay in Paving Averted Following Leak in Asphalt Kettle—Start on Minnesota Today.

Loosening of rivets in the bottom of one of the big kettles at the mixing plant of the paving company, causing the contents to leak out, would have resulted in a serious delay had not a bucket brigade been brought into action. The asphalt threatened to fill the driveway where trucks are loaded with the mixture for the streets, but this was averted, the hot stuff being carried to a reservoir which was quickly dug.

The other two kettles, being in condition for use, paving was resumed at 11:30 a. m. on Saturday on Minnesota street, starting east from Wall. The asphalt which leaked may be recovered after it cools. This is the second accident of the kind at the plant.

LONG TRIP IS MADE BEFORE BREAKFAST
From within five miles of Elk lake to Bend before breakfast this morning was the driving record made by M. W. Wagner, who, with Charles G. Wilson, fished at the lake Sunday. They started at 4:55 o'clock and entered the city limits at 7:50 traveling approximately 50 miles.

The trip was by way of the Big river ranger station. The road from the head of Fall river to the Vandeventer ranch by this route is now thoroughly dry. The Dalles-California highway from the Vandeventer ranch to Bend is also in good condition, the distance being made in 35 minutes.
