**DEAD HOPPERS
COVER GRASS**

TEST POISONING ON 20 ACRE TRACT AT CRANE PRAIRIE HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL—WHOLESALE ATTACK PLANNED.

Dead grasshoppers can be scooped up by the bushel from the 20 acres at Crane Prairie, where a mixture of molasses, bran, sawdust, arsenic and lemon juice was scattered last week. County Agriculturist D. L. Jamison reported on a visit to Bend. There are still countless numbers of hoppers to be dealt with, however, and Jamison, regarding the work already done as merely a demonstration, has shipped out quantities of material for a wholesale poisoning campaign.

Equally good work has been done at Summit Prairie in the Ochoco forest by using banana oil for scent, and by using all sawdust, and no bran, Jamison is advised, and, as the expense involved is less, the prescrip-

tion will be changed when the war on the grasshopper pest, begins in earnest.

Unless the insects are successfully combated this year, not only will the range for 1700 head of cattle be wiped out, but the plague of hoppers will spread rapidly in years to come, Jamison fears.

**FIRE IN JACKPINES
CAUSE OF TROUBLE**

Not Accidental, Believes Fire Warden—Forty Acres Burned Over Between Big and Little Rivers.

Fire in the jack pines between Big and Little rivers, near the Big river ranger station, reported under control earlier in the week, was causing considerable trouble Wednesday. State Fire Warden Jack Bowman stated. No appropriation covers fire fighting in the area in question, as it is on a jack pine tract which has been homesteaded. About 40 acres has been burned over.

There is no question but that the fire was set, Bowman believes. He called attention to the strict provisions of the law, which provides a penalty of up to \$100 for allowing a

fire to escape from privately owned land.
