FARMERS WILL RECOVER FIRST

HOPEFUL TREND SEEN BY FARMER SMITH

Federal Reserve System Saved A Panic This Year, Says Railroad

Agriculturist — Business Men And Farmers Pull Together.

"The farmer was the first hit when this reconstruction period came, but he will be the first to recover," said C. L. Smith, better known as Farmer Smith, agriculturist for the O-W. R. & N., who was in Bend to attend the convention of the editorial association, of which he is a member.

"Of course it will take time to get back to normal. In the panic of '93, the crisis came in 6 months, and it took five years to recover. This is not a panic, and recovery will not take so long. Every time we have a financial stringency, we get out of it easier than we did the time before. We profit by experience, and also in this case the Federal Reserve bank saved a panic.

"Never before have merchants and business men in general been so anxious to help the farmer. It is true that only 14 per cent of loans under the Federal Reserve system were to farmers, but this is the biggest amount in history. Many loans to merchants helped them to carry the farmers.

Nation Still Richest

"Though we may be passing through a crisis, this is still the richest nation in the world. The people are not very badly off. Even the men you see in the cities looking for jobs look prosperous. The trouble is mostly psychological.

"Crops from coast to coast are looking better than they ever have in my experience," said Smith, who returned in May from attending the National Editorial convention. He has just come from Idaho, where he was interested in the campaign to increase dairying.

Railroad Aids Farmers

Sunflowers are becoming a very satisfactory crop in Wallawa county as well as here, he remarked. Not as much trouble has been experienced in learning when to harvest and how to cure sunflowers as was had with corn.

"I wish farmers would realize that I am working for their interests because the company I represent profits with their prosperity," he stated.

HAY CUTTING ENDS WITH THIS WEEK

Crop Up To Standard In Some Parts of County, Declared To Be Light Elsewhere—Late Spring Cause.

Haying all over the county is well along, this week seeing its end on most alfalfa farms. Although labor was scarce at first, this has not prevented the farmers from getting in their hay in good time.

In some parts of the county the crop was light not over a ton to the acre the cause being, farmers says, a late spring and lack of water. Elsewhere the crop is up to standard, and the raisers declare that the growing season was more nearly ideal than has been experienced for many years.

SON OF BEND MAN PASSES IN IDAHO

Word has been received here of the death of Alvin B. O'Neill, son of J. H. O'Neill of Bend, at Hailey, Ida. Spotted fever, caused by the bite of a tick, was the cause of death.

O'Neill was 51 years of age, and was prominent in mining circles in Idaho. His sister, Mrs. C. E. Preedy, of Leoti, Kansas, was with him when death came, and is now paying her father a two weeks visit in Bend.

CONDITION OF ROADS IS TOLD

The latest state highway commission bulletin, reporting on the condition of the roads in the Dalles district, is as follows:

COLUMBIA RIVER HIGHWAY

Portland to Hood River—Paved.

Hood River-Mosier—Paving operations under way, road closed to traffic 8:00 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Open 12:30 to 1:00 p. m. Closed 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. Open 5:30 p. m. to 8:00 a. m. During the time this road is closed traffic can detour by way of the old Mosier hill, though it is advisable to time a trip to take advantage of open hours on the highway. Mosier hill is passable, but travel is cautioned to use care in driving, and have plenty of gas.

Mosier-The Dalles—New gravelled road in fair condition—a much easier and safer road than seven mile hill. Paving operations will start about August 1st, at which time it will be necessary to detour during working hours.

The Dalles-Deschutes River—New road not yet open—impassable. Take usual road over the hill. Deschutes river bridge open—no toll. New road will probably be open by August 15.

Deschutes River-Hoppper Junction—Good gravel or crushed rock, road now completed for entire distance.

THE DALLES-CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY

(To Central Oregon)

The Dalles-Madras—Road in fair shape—usual summer condition of this road. Through Dufur, Maupin, Bake Oven or Criterion, Antelope to Madras.

Madras-Crooked River—New crushed rock road.

Crooked River-Bend—Newly gravelled road in good condition.

Bend-Allen's Ranch—(20 miles.) Cinders road in fair condition.

Allen's Ranch-Crescent (Through La Pine)—Fair condition.

SHERMAN HIGHWAY

(To Central Oregon)

The Dalles-Madras (Bend and Redmond)—Through Sherman County, by way of Wasco, Moro, Grass Valley, Shaniko and Antelope—Road in good condition.

JOHN DAY HIGHWAY

Arlington-Condor—Fair condition.

Condor-Fossil—Fair, except six miles between Thirty Mile and Hayville, still necessary to use old road, as new road is in process of construction and very rough.

Fossil-Butte Creek Summit—Fair condition. Road being macadamized. No delay to traffic.

Summit to Tilley's (Mouth of Service Creek)—Unimproved, very rough and slow.

Tilley's to Spray—New road, fair condition.

Highway from Spray to Dayville not yet open on account of bridges still under construction. To get to Dayville, John Day, Canyon City or Prairie City, it is necessary to go by way of Spray, Monument, Long Creek and Mt. Vernon, or by way of Mitchell and Dayville from Tilley's or Service Creek. The latter road is in much better condition, and travel is advised to take this route. The new road will be open about September 15th.

MCKENZIE HIGHWAY

McKenzie Pass now open to travel.

Sisters-Redmond—Good condition.

Redmond-Pineville—New gravelled road except two and a half miles now being gravelled.

Pineville-Forest Boundary—Under grading contract. Very rough over part of construction, but passable at all hours.

Forest Boundary-Mitchell—Rocked to Summit, and in good condition. Summit to Mitchell open to automobile travel, and in fair condition.

CENTRAL OREGON HIGHWAY

Bend-Burns—Fair condition. Take new road out of Bend for 16 miles.

LA PINE-LAKEVIEW HIGHWAY

Bend-Fort Rock, (by way of La Pine)—Road very crooked and slow, as well as dusty. Better road by way of Milliean, and ten miles shorter.

meeting of the Ladies' Aid Society of the Lutheran church held in this

city last week. As a result of the

meeting, several of the ladies expressed themselves as being interested in the making of dress forms,

and a class in this work will be started at a meeting to be held August 5, at the home of Mrs. S. H. Sannerud, on the south highway. Mrs. Slagsvold, president of the Ladies Aid, will accompany Miss Comegys to this meeting.

Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, state leader of home demonstration work, arrived in Bend Tuesday to attend a conference with Miss Comegys, Miss Julia Clock, county nurse, and Miss Jane L. Allen, state advisory nurse. The object of the conference was to establish a basis of cooperation between the county nurse and the home demonstration agent, at the same time avoiding duplication of effort. Similar conferences are to be held in other counties having a county nurse and a home demonstration agent.

Spencer in Bend. Mrs. Spencer expects to try both cooking and canning, and will be glad to explain the operation of the cooker, or to demonstrate to any who are interested.

Almost a Billion Hoppers Killed With Poison at Crane Prairie, But Survivors Outnumber Dead, Reports Jamison

Of the eleven billion grasshoppers roughly estimated to have

inhabited Crane Prairie two weeks ago, 914,760,000 are dead as the

result of the arsenic poisoning campaign conducted by County

Agriculturist D. L. Jamison. At any rate, these are the figures given out by Jamison after a lengthy computation this morning.

The insect dead are strewn over 200 acres, Jamison says. An additional 200 acres was sprinkled

with poison but so sparingly that the results were not good, Jamison says.

The new generation of grasshoppers is still hatching at the

prairie, and as they are constantly on the move, Jamison considers that it is better to declare an

armistice until the insects concentrate on some definite area. If this is done, a determined effort will be made to wipe out the hoppers just before they lay their

eggs in the fall.
