

# SHEVLIN-HIXON PICNIC DRAWS RECORD CROWD

## EMPLOYEES GIVE CUP TO M'CANN

## RACES HOLD INTEREST

Train Ride To Benham Falls Picnic Ground Enjoyed by Over 2,000—Stacks of Watermelon And Gallons of Ice Cream Disappear.

The second annual Shevlin-Hixon picnic, held Sunday at Benham Falls, proved more popular than the first, over 2000 people attending. The event was well planned, as there was "something doing" every minute.

Not the least enjoyable feature of the day was the train ride to the picnic grounds, which afforded a view of the Deschutes river and the mountains and timber which a large part of the crowd had never seen before.

The picnic ground was well selected, in a pretty grove of pines, the ground carpeted with moss and grasses and pine needles. It lay between a new spur of the logging railroad and a quiet bend in the Deschutes. The ground was amply large for the crowd to lunch and roam about, although little time was afforded for strolling.

Stacks of watermelon and gallon after gallon of ice cream, furnished by the company, disappeared in short order. Lemonade was also furnished, and sandwiches, cake and coffee for those who did not bring their own lunches. The band played during part of the luncheon hour. It also entertained the crowd before the train left Bend in the morning, and after the program of sports.

The surprise which was announced last week was indeed a surprise not only to all but a few of the crowd, but to T. A. McCann, who was the central figure of it. Following a speech in which Jack Mahoney expressed the regret of the employees at losing their manager, Mr. McCann was presented with a beautiful loving cup, purchased by the employees. Mahoney declared that Mr. McCann would always be welcomed back at any time that he should visit Bend. Mr. McCann replied with a few words of appreciation for the present.

Real athletic ability was displayed in the sports, which occupied most of the afternoon. Among the consistent winners were Arthur Norcott, former Bend high school athlete, and A. P. Malone, Columbia university star of a few seasons ago, who showed real form in the high jump and shot put. Fast time was made in many of the races.

The orange diving and watermelon eating contests were a revelation to mothers, who wondered where their boys learned such manners. Watermelon disappeared with amazing rapidity. What happened to the seeds in an unsolved mystery.

"Kid" Taylor and Eddie Claire gave a boxing exhibition, sparring for three two-minute rounds. Duffy Knorr was the referee.
