

CHINESE ROOSTERS ARE SHIPPED HERE

Six Dozen Birds Supplied For Deschutes County By Commission —Do Well In Klamath.

Six dozen Chinese pheasant roosters have been shipped by the game commission to H. J. Overturn, and turned loose in Deschutes county. About 75 hens were turned loose here two weeks ago. Fewer roosters are supplied for the reason that they are more hardy, according to members of the commission.

Outside of those shipped in, there are few pheasants in Deschutes county. Klamath county has done so well with pheasants received in the past few years that the people there plan to ask an open season next year.
