## SEVENTEEN COYOTES TAKEN BY TRAPPER

Seventeen coyotes and five bobcats in 17 days were the record of Alfred Andrews, government trapper, in Fort Rock valley in September. It is stated at forest service headquarters. The state total for predatory animals killed during the month by trappers in the employ of the U. S. Biological service was 222 coyotes, 22 bobcats, seven bears, and two raccoons.

## DIATOMITE COMPANY DEVELOPING POWER

Plant Near Lower Bridge Will Have 454 Horsepower Capacity, Engineer's Report Announces.

That the Western Diatomite Company is constructing a power plant on the Deschutes river near Lower Bridge for the development of 454 horsepower to be used in connection with their diatomite quarries in this county, is the statement made by Percy A. Copper, state engineer, in his quarterly report.

During the months of July, August, and September, the state engineer issued 109 permits to appropriate water which cover the irrigation of 3832 acres of land, the development of 499 horsepower, the use of water for municipal, domestic, mining, fluming and other purposes. The estimated cost of the construction work contemplated by the appropriations amounts to approximately \$103,000.00. During this period, permits were issued for the construction of seven reservoirs for the storage of 720 acre feet of water at an estimated cost of approximately \$12,000.00.

## NORWEGIAN BOYS' PILOT ARRESTED

Youths From Europe Find Bend An Exciting Place—Are Led To Home of Theater Man.

Two Norwegian boys who arrived in Bend Sunday in search of their uncle met with adventure in the form of John Hanson, who spoke their

language and offered to show them the way to the relative's home. Hanson was not exactly sober, which may explain why he took the strangers to the home of J. B. Sparks. Disturbance created there in a strange tongue resulted in a call for the police.

Hanson and his proteges left, but they were later located by Chief R. H. Fox. Anton Aune acted as interpreter, and through him Fox determined that the young foreigners were blameless. The chief today located their uncle. Hanson paid a \$10 fine in police court.
