

REDMOND FAIR EXHIBITS DRAW RECORD CROWD

JUDGES SCRUTINIZE
FARM PRODUCTS

THURSDAY BEND DAY

Preparations Completed For Entertainment of Visitors—County Seat Delegation To Take Sheelin Band On Trip.

REDMOND, Oct. 12.—With crowds on hand which promise to eclipse even last year's record for attendance, the Deschutes County fair and Redmond Potato show opened here this morning. Exhibits are heavy, an excellent race program was scheduled to start this afternoon, and additional entertainment is provided in the form of public dancing nightly, carnival attractions, and the Bend-Redmond football game scheduled for tomorrow afternoon.

Judging of agricultural exhibits started this afternoon and will probably be completed tomorrow, when judging of poultry and stock will begin. Exceptional merit is noted in the community displays.

Wisdom of Building Shown

The large number of entries being made is proving the wisdom of the fair administration in erecting a new building for poultry and adding 100 feet to the stock sheds. The track, always rated among the fastest in Central Oregon, is even more speedy this year, racing men declare.

Preparations are completed for the entertainment of visitors from the county seat on Thursday, Bend Day. The fair board has been informed that Bend business men who attend tomorrow will bring with them The Sheelin-Hixon band.

Parade is Planned

The "Bend Day" procession at Redmond was to form at 1:45 o'clock or a little sooner behind the band, which will be in front of the hotels, headed south, and go from there to the fair grounds. All Bend people who drive to Redmond are requested to decorate their cars, at least to have a Bend sign displayed. This announcement was made by the Commercial club committee at yesterday's luncheon.

"More business from outlying districts is now coming to the Bend stores than ever before," said D. G. McPherson, attributing this fact to the removal of former prejudices. He stated that a big Bend delegation at the fair would do much to further this condition. President Hamilton also urged as many as possible to attend the fair and take part in the procession. The committee to arrange this feature was composed of A. Whisman, E. L. Vinal and Clarence Mannheim.

CONGRESS IS PAVED WITHOUT A DEFICIT

Estimated Cost of Improvement and Actual Cost Nearly Coincide—
Delaware Must Pay \$1500 More

There will be no deficit assessment levied against property holders on Congress street for paying recently completed, City Recorder Ross Farnham stated Wednesday. The estimated cost of the improvement was so close to the amount actually due the contractor that the slight credit which property holders have would amount to but a small fraction of a dollar on each lot.

On Delaware avenue, the recorder states, a deficit of \$1500 is listed, about six per cent in addition to the estimated cost, so that an assessment will have to be levied on this. The ratio of deficit to estimate on this improvement is the same as for the paving of the downtown streets.

DEMONSTRATOR TO HAVE FAIR BOOTH

A display of labor saving devices for the home is occupying the home demonstration booth at the county fair at Redmond this week, Miss Eva Comegys announces. The exhibits were donated by Bend and Redmond hardware merchants. There will be a demonstration of the pressure cooker daily, and talks will be given on the use of the other devices. Miss Comegys judged the women's exhibits at the Crook county fair last week.

COLUMBUS HONORED IN SCHOOLS TODAY

General Programs Held At Reid and Kenwood, Central Has Separate Observance In Each Room.

Columbus Day was observed fittingly, although briefly, in all of the grade schools of the city yesterday. A program was held early this afternoon on the lawn of the Reid school, each grade taking part. The Kenwood also had a general program of 15 numbers pertaining to Columbus and of patriotic trend, opening with a flag salute. The Central school held separate exercises in each room.

The program at the Reid opened with a flag salute and the singing of America by the entire school. "The Story of Columbus" was given by the 5th and 6th grades; a dance by the first; "Columbus" by the 4th. The program ended with the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner."

PORTLAND SUPPORT ACCORDED HIGHWAY

Telegram Writer In Letter Says That Paper Is Backing The Dalles-California Route.

Support for The Dalles-California highway is pledged by the Portland Evening Telegram in a letter received Wednesday at Commercial club headquarters from Henry M. Hansen, political writer of the Portland paper.

Hansen states that the omission of the state road east of the mountains from a list of highways given in a recent article appearing in the Telegram was not in any way intended as opposition to this development, as had been intimated locally. He points out that editorials favoring the construction of the highway have already been published in the Telegram, and that more may be expected.

GREAT SHOCK AFFECTS HAIR

Well-Authenticated Cases of Sudden Whitening Over the More Important Nerve Centers.

There has been some interesting correspondence in the Scientific American about the possibility of a person's hair "turning white overnight," and now Elmer G. Still of Livermore, Cal., contributes a letter from the viewpoint of a physiologist. He asserts that there are many cases on record in which a great shock to a specially sensitive emotion was followed at once by whitening of the hair just over the region of the brain in which this emotion is situated.

He cites one case of a man with a large bump of cautiousness, who was upset from a sail boat and clung all night to its bottom. In the morning his hair had turned gray in two tufts the size of a half dollar on each side of his head, right over the centers of cautiousness.

Another was the case of a woman whose hair fell out over the region of conjugal love while her husband was undergoing a serious operation. The hair grew in again, but quite white. The region of conjugal love is situated about two inches directly back horizontally from the meatus of the ear.

Another is that of a man with a triangular tuft of white hair just below the center of the back of the head, over the region of philoprogenitiveness, or love of children, and on inquiry Mr. Still found that he was a man remarkably fond of children.

BELIEVE THEY HOODWINK GOD

Chinese Seemingly Have Little Respect for the Intellectuality of Their Deities.

One of the strangest things about the religion of the Chinese is the reverence they hold for their gods, despite the belief that the gods are gullible as a man of inferior intellect. Instead of attributing infallibility to the deities they worship, as all other races have done, the Chinese resort to tricks of childish simplicity and are sure they have deceived the god.

Usually the tricks employed are to make sure the god does not betray the sins of a Chinese to the higher deities. An amazing example is the treatment of the kitchen god just before he is to start on one of his periodic visits to heaven. This trip is limited, because the kitchen god may be absent only seven days.

The householder thinks he must prevent the god from reciting his sins to the deities. So it is the general custom, before the god is to depart on the seven day's absence, to prepare large hollow balls of the god's favorite candy. The kitchen deity has a very small throat. When the candy, of which he is extremely fond, is placed before him, the Chinese say the god stuffs his mouth with it, being too glutinous to leave any behind. His small throat prevents swallowing the confection, and thus when he appears before the ruling deities he is unable to talk, and the householder's sins remain a secret.

"Apple-Pie Order."

Few persons take time to trace expressions they use every day. When a thing is in "apple-pie order," for example, you mean, of course, that it is clean and neat and generally everything that it should be. The expression originated under somewhat different circumstances, observes the New York Sun.

"Apple-pie order" is an old New England phrase, and is well grounded in the blue laws of several centuries ago. Formerly the New England housewife did little work on Sunday and among the many things she didn't do was baking. Everything of that nature was finished Saturday night. When the baking was done all the pies and cakes were ranged in a row on the kitchen shelf. With the flour still on her hands and apron, the good housewife would come out with a smile on her face ready for the Sabbath. Everything was in "apple-pie order."

Birds That Dive.

Aquatic birds that are ordinarily able to float high on the water can also sink at will by expelling the air that is inclosed within the film of feathers surrounding their bodies, thus making them heavier than water.

This mechanical trick on the part of diving birds is probably familiar to all who have watched the kingfisher at close quarters and have noted the sudden contraction in the bird's apparent size as it takes the plunge. This is much more easily observed in the case of the starting, which sometimes imitates the kingfisher by plunging into the water. The shrinkage of the bird is very apparent when, after hovering above the surface, it turns downward to dive.

Some One Else's or Some One's Else.

The expressions some one else, anyone else, everyone else, somebody else, etc., are used correctly as substantive phrases (that is, used as a noun, serving as subject or object, whether a single word, phrase or clause) and have the possessive inflection upon the else, as some one else's house. Some hold these phrases as elliptical expressions (expressions having part omitted), as, the house is some one's else (that is, other than the person previously mentioned). Therefore, either some one else's or some one's else is correct. However, some one else's is the expression in general use at the present time.

LIBRARY LOANS MAY DOUBLE OLD FIGURE

Circulation of volumes from the Deschutes county library for 1921 promises to double that of the previous year. The number of books loaned during 1920 was 14,170, while for the first nine months of the present year the circulation has totaled 22,472, according to the librarian's report. The number of volumes in the library has been increased from 2,388 to 3,951.

The September circulation amounted to 1947 volumes. There were added to the library 171 books during the month.

The county library will maintain at the county fair at Redmond next week a booth for the purpose of acquainting Deschutes county people with the work that the library is prepared to do.
