## SCHOOLS WILL HAVE PHYSICAL TRAINING

Physical training as stipulated by state law, will be reintroduced in the Bend schools, it was decided when the governing board of the Bend Amateur Athletic club closed a contract with the school board to provide such instruction for the grade pupils for the balance of the school year for \$275. A once a week class will be held in the gymnasium, probably in the morning, and Albert Tauscher, physical director of the B. A. A. C. will be the instructor.

The directors authorized N. A. Cobb, club manager, to proceed with the decorating of the American Legion club rooms in the building, according to plans recently outlined by Percy A. Stevens post.

It was decided that the club will hereafter consider its function to be that of conducting an athletic organization, and of handling the renting of the building. Club dances will no longer be given.
